

North Dakota Homeless Population Point in Time Survey January 28, 2009

The North Dakota Coalition for Homeless People (NDCHP) conducted a statewide point-in-time survey of homeless people on January 28, 2009. The survey collected information relating to demographics, education, employment, veteran status, common characteristics, and service utilization.

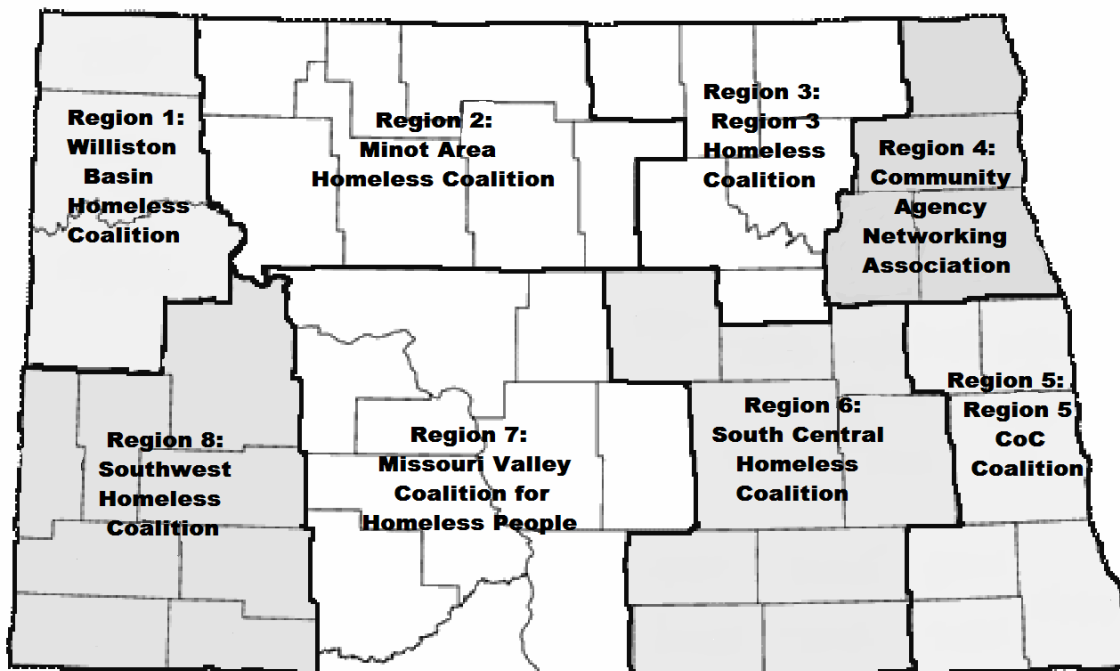
The following table shows the total count of homeless persons by region, age and status as “chronic” or “long term homeless”.

* Information regarding age was not available for 11 homeless persons.

¹ *Chronic status* is determined using the HUD definition, which is an individual with a disabling condition who has been homeless for at least one year or, four or more times in the last three years, and is sleeping either in an emergency shelter or somewhere not fit for human habitation.

² *Long term homeless (LTH)* is the definition adopted by the ND Interagency Council on Homelessness, which is an individual or a family with a disabling condition who has been homeless continuously for at least one year or more than four times in the last three years. The ICH definition does not exclude people who are currently living “doubled up” with friends/family, people precariously housed in motels or those in transitional housing.



A brief summary of the findings from North Dakota's 2009 point-in-time survey follows. It makes note of any changes that have taken place since 2005, as well as any differences between the overall homeless population and the chronic homeless or long-term homeless. More detailed information is contained within the data tables included after the summary.

- **Total count.** North Dakota's 2009 point-in-time survey counted 987 homeless individuals: 756 adults, 220 children under 18 and 11 persons for whom age was not provided. Seventy homeless individuals fit the definition of chronic homeless and 227 were considered long-term homeless. Unaccompanied individuals accounted for 593 of the homeless persons, while 349 were in families that had children under 18 and 45 were in families without children under 18.
 - After increasing continuously from 2005 to 2007, and then dropping slightly in 2008, the number of homeless individuals counted in North Dakota's point-in-time survey spiked up to a new high in 2009.

- **Type of shelter.** Half of North Dakota's homeless population was staying in an emergency shelter and about one-third was in transitional housing.
 - Virtually all of the chronic homeless were in emergency shelters.

- **Duration of homelessness.** In North Dakota, a typical homeless episode lasts less than half a year.
 - The chronic and long-term homeless had typically been homeless for a much longer period of time.
 - Compared to previous years, the duration of homelessness overall has decreased.
 - Compared to 2008, the duration of homelessness for the chronic homeless has decreased.

- **Frequency of homelessness.** Nearly three out of five homeless persons had been homeless once in the past three years, one in five had been homeless twice, 8% had three homeless episodes and 12% had four or more episodes of homelessness.
 - The number of chronic homeless persons and long-term homeless persons who have been homeless once has increased since 2008.

- **Family status.** Less than one in five homeless households contained a family of two or more individuals; 14% of the households included children under 18. Less than 1% were headed by a youth under 18 and 9% were headed by someone between 18 and 21.
 - After steadily increasing from 2006 to 2008, the proportion of the overall homeless population that is comprised of families decreased in 2009.
 - By definition, the chronic homeless did not include any families.

- **Demographics of Homeless Population.** Men outnumber women by a ratio of 3:2 in North Dakota's adult homeless population. The average age of homeless men was 42.1 years, the average age of homeless women was 35.7 years and the average age of homeless children was 6.0 years. Over half of the homeless were white; 28% were American Indian. Forty-seven percent had completed high school or earned their GED and 24% had attended at least some college.
 - Unlike the number of homeless adults, which increased, the number of homeless children under 18 has decreased for the first time since 2005.
 - In comparison to the overall homeless population, the chronic and long-term homeless were more likely to be white and male. The chronic homeless were less likely than the overall homeless population or long-term homeless to be American Indian.

- **Sources of Income.** Half of North Dakota's homeless population received income from a job, while one in four received food stamps and about one in five got help from family and friends.
 - The percentage of homeless with a job has increased since 2008, especially among the chronic homeless.
 - Among the long-term homeless, the percentages receiving SSI and Medicaid has doubled since 2008.

- **Common Characteristics of Homeless Population.** An inability to afford rent, unemployment, and a history of substance abuse are the most commonly shared characteristics among the homeless population in North Dakota.
 - Other characteristics shared by at least one in five homeless persons included: bad credit, a criminal record, family break-up, medical problems, mental illness, money management problems, moving to a new area recently and being underemployed.
 - The chronic homeless are more likely than the overall homeless population to have medical problems, have a history of substance abuse or be unable to afford rent. The chronic homeless were less likely to have a criminal record.
 - Within the chronic homeless population, the prevalence of having a history of substance abuse or money management problems decreased in 2008 only to increase again in 2009.
 - Compared to 2008, the number of chronic homeless who were unemployed or veterans has decreased.
 - Since 2007, the number of chronic homeless persons who are unable to afford rent has been dropping. The number has also decreased among the long-term homeless since 2008.
 - The long-term homeless are more likely than the overall homeless population to have medical problems, mental illness, money management problems and a history of substance abuse.

- **Reasons for Homelessness.** The most common causes of homeless in North Dakota continue to be an inability to afford rent, unemployment and a history of substance abuse.
 - From 2006 to 2008, the prevalence of individuals being homeless because of an inability to pay rent, unemployment and substance abuse decreased. In 2009, these numbers began to increase again.
 - Bad credit was a more pronounced problem among the chronic homeless, as were an inability to pay rent and unemployment.
 - Among the chronic homeless, bad credit, a history of substance abuse, an inability to pay rent and unemployment increased in 2009 after decreasing in 2008.
 - Mental illness and a history of substance abuse were more common among the chronic and long-term homeless than the overall homeless population.
 - While the number of long-term homeless who attributed their homelessness to mental illness or a history of substance abuse steadily decreased from 2006 to 2008, both numbers increased in 2009.

- **Service Needs.** Permanent housing and transportation continue to be the two services most difficult for homeless persons to access. The homeless population was most likely to name a job as what would most help them obtain housing.
 - Since 2007, there have been continued increases in the percentage of homeless individuals receiving clothing, case management, transitional housing, life skills training and transportation.
 - The percentage of individuals not providing a response regarding what would most help them obtain housing remains high, especially among the chronic and long-term homeless.
 - With the exception of case management, the chronic homeless were more likely to utilize services that meet basic needs than the general homeless population or the long-term homeless. They were also more likely to use storage services.
 - Both the chronic and long-term homeless were more apt to have received medical/dental care and medication than the general homeless population. The long-term homeless were also more likely to have received mental health care, transitional housing, SSI and SSDI.
 - Among the chronic homeless, usage of services providing food/hot meals, case management, medication, medical/dental care, transitional housing, and storage increased since 2008. On the other hand, usage of services providing emergency shelter has decreased.
 - Among the long-term homeless, the number of individuals receiving medication continues to rise. Increases were also seen in those who received medical/dental care and life skills training. Since 2008, the percentage receiving emergency shelter or clothing has dropped.
