Message From the Chief



On behalf of the members of the Fargo Fire Department I am truly honored to present to you our 2014 Annual Report. 2014 was another outstanding year for the Fargo Fire Department. As you will see in this report Fargo continues to remain one of the safest communities to live in when it comes to fire and other related emergencies. While our number of calls for service has again increased, the number of fires and the property loss has decreased compared to 2013. The mission of the Fargo Fire Department is: *Protect lives and property from fire and other emergencies; to respond in a professional and courteous manner; to reduce the rate of emergencies through public education and code enforcement.*

This report reflects the hard work and dedication of the employees of the Department who make significant sacrifices to ensure that the citizens and visitors of the City of Fargo receive the quality level of service they have become accustom to.

The following are some of our major accomplishments for 2014:

•Insurance Services Organization (ISO) rates Fargo as a Class 2 community. The Public Protection Classification rates communities on a scale from 1 to 10. This rating places Fargo in the top 725 fire departments out of nearly 42,000 in the country.

•Regional Response Training. Fargo Fire and Jamestown Fire conducted three training exercises geared toward ensuring both departments are able to meet response requirement expectations of the Memorandums of Understanding that each department has with the North Dakota Department of Emergency Services.

•Community Resiliency Program. The Fargo Fire Department partnered with the American Red Cross to provide smoke detectors and safety information to the Madison Neighborhood and Countryside Trailer Court.

•Fire Protection System Plan Review Class. Members of the Fire Prevention Bureau and other fire prevention specialists from around the state met in Fargo to work to become certified as fire sprinkler plan reviewers.

•Retirements. 2014 saw the retirements of three long time employees. Fire Marshal Norm Scott and Assistant Chiefs Steve Balstad and Larry Schuh retired after a combined 123 years of service. These three gentlemen are among only 16 employees to reach 40 years of employment with the Fargo Fire Department.

•Policy and Guideline Review. The department completed a review of all policies and guidelines to ensure they meet industry standards.

•14 fire department personnel attended Crude by Rail Training at the American Association of Railroad's Transportation Test Center in Pueblo, Colorado.

•12 fire department personnel attended a number of classes at the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg, MD.

As the community continues to grow so do the needs of the Fargo Fire Department. The need for a fire station in south Fargo is becoming more evident. In this area, there continue to be more calls for service and response times from the nearest fire station are longer.

I am reminded daily of the great service the Fargo Fire Department provides this community. I am proud of the work we do and I am thankful for the support we receive from our City Commission, other city departments, and the community. I want to thank everyone who helped make 2014 a safe year.

2014 Year Review

Services

The Fargo Fire Department Suppression Division responds to all fires, fire alarm notifications, emergency medical calls, hazardous materials responses, and technical rescues. The operations members also perform company level inspections in all businesses within the city. This division also works in conjunction with the City of Fargo Hydrants and Mains Division to flush all 6,400 fire hydrants in the city.

The Support Services Division is staffed with an Assistant Fire Chief, one Emergency Manager/Battalion Chief, and 2 Training Captains. This division is responsible for all training conducted within the department. This division also oversees all equipment, maintenance, and training records for the department. The Administration Division coordinates all public relations activities, Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT), and the HeartSafe Fargo Public Access Defibrillation Program (PAD).





The Fire Prevention Bureau is staffed with 4 Fire

Inspector/Investigators and an Assistant Chief who serves as the Fire Marshal. The FPB annually inspects all schools, churches, gas stations, medical facilities, bars and restaurants. The FPB also provides the "Learn Not to Burn Program" in all schools in the city.

Resources

The Fire Department operates out of 7 fire stations strategically located throughout the City. Our daily staffing is 35 personnel with a minimum of 27 personnel on duty each day. There are 7 engine companies and 2 truck companies and 2 command vehicles in service each day to serve the needs of the citizens and visitors of the City of Fargo.



The Fargo Fire Department has entered into two Memorandums of Understanding (MOU) with the State of North Dakota. The MOU's are for Hazardous Materials response and Technical Rescue response to the Southeast Region of the State.

Insurance Services Organization (ISO)

Public Protection Classification (PPC) ISO collects information on more than 47,000 municipal fire-protection communities throughout the United States. In each of those communities, ISO analyzes the relevant data using the Fire Suppression Rating Schedule (FSRS). ISO then assigns a Public Protection Classification from 1 to 10. Class 1 generally represents superior property fire protection, and Class 10 indicates that the area's fire-suppression program doesn't meet ISO's minimum criteria. Fargo Fire Departments currently has a community classification of 2. The program provides an objective, countrywide standard that helps fire departments in planning and budgeting for facilities, equipment, and training. By securing lower fire insurance premiums for communities with better public protection, the PPC program provides incentives and rewards for communities that choose to improve their firefighting services.

<u>Center for Public Safety Excellence</u> (CPSE) Accreditation

In 2014 the Fargo Fire Department completed its fourth year as an accredited fire department. The accreditation was initially granted for a five year period. Out of 32,000 fire departments in the United States, there are 155 accredited fire departments. The Fargo Fire Department is the only fire department in North Dakota that is accredited. During the interim years fire departments are asked to submit annual compliance reports. The FFD submitted its report in August and received information that we continue to be a member in good standing.



2014 Year Overview

All Operations personnel completed annual EMT training and were recertified by the National Registry Of Emergency Medical Technicians

Annual medical exams were conducted for all personnel in compliance with NFPA 1582. All Fire Companies completed annual training evolutions in accordance with EPA, NFPA, and OSHA standards.

A new Ladder Truck was ordered from Spartan ERV and is scheduled for delivery later in 2015

Annual physical fitness testing was conducted for all personnel.

Flu vaccinations were offered through Fargo/Cass Public Health for all employees.

All hose and appliances were tested to NFPA standards. Conducted promotional examination for the position of Fire Captain.

All ground ladders were tested to NFPA Standards.

A new rescue pumper was received and put into service.

Technical Rescue personnel were Pro Board certified in Confined Space Level 1 and 2, Trench Rescue 1 and have started certification for Structural Collapse. Trench Rescue 2 final testing will be done this summer.

Fire Prevention Bureau



Fire Marshal Ryan Erickson The Fire Prevention Bureau continues to reduce risk through public education, fire prevention inspections, and fire investigations.

In February of 2014 Fire Marshal Norm Scott retired. Fire Marshal Scott positively impacted the fire prevention bureau and the City of Fargo. We are grateful for his significant contribution towards fire prevention and risk reduction. We wish him the best in retirement.

We continue to reach out to the children in the community through the "Learn not to burn" program. This year 3,025 children were taught "Two ways out" and 3,090 were taught "Burn Prevention".

Our adult education system gave safety talks, presentations, and fire extinguisher training to over 500 individuals. The audience includes apartment building managers, building safety professionals, and childcare providers.

Annually, in October we participate in the National Fire Prevention Association fire prevention week. Fargo Fire Department along with the American Red Cross kicked off fire prevention week by installing 225 smoke detectors in the Madison Neighborhood.

In December, the Fire Prevention Bureau along with the American Red Cross installed 87 smoke detectors in the Countryside Trailer Court. The smoke detectors that were installed during these events were 10 year sealed smoke detectors, which will continue to protect families with little to no maintenance.

Fire Prevention

Inspections are done to determine compliance with the Fire code. The fire prevention bureau along with suppression personnel inspect commercial and residential occupancies. Inspections for new construction have increased substantially. The city of Fargo issued building permits for over \$1 billion of construction value during 2014. The Fire Department has worked diligently to ensure that new construction is built safely, while still ensuring the safety of existing structures.

Fire Investigations

Fargo Fire Department has three Fire Prevention Bureau investigators and five shift investigators that have achieved Fire Investigation Technician (FIT) Certification through the International Association of Arson Investigators (IAAI).

Investigations are conducted to determine origin and cause. The results of 2014's fire investigations are below. Fargo's fire problem is consistent with national trends. Cooking fires and smoking material fires are the most common cause of fires in the City of Fargo.

As the City of Fargo continues to grow, so do the number of emergency calls that the FFD responds to. In 2014 the FFD went on 7,196 calls for service which is an increase of 212 from 2013. The average number of calls per day is 19.72. This is an increase of 60% from 5 years ago.

Technology Update

The fire department continues with and expands the use of technology to better server the citizens of Fargo.



IPads are being used for fire prevention inspections and hydrant inspections.



Pulse Point CPR phone app.



Getac Computers have been mounted in each unit for receiving calls from dispatch and getting information on scene.



Thermal imaging cameras are used for search and rescue, Haz Mat, water leaks, and overhaul at fires.

Fire Training

<u>Fire suppression personnel</u> completed an average of 180 hours per person of fire ground training. Additional training hours were completed in technical rescue, driver/pump operator, aircraft fires, and hazardous materials.

Recruit Training

In 2014 eight new firefighters completed the six week Fargo Fire Department Fire Academy. Firefighters received training on how to respond to incidents involving: fire, EMS, vehicle extrication and hazardous materials. Candidates have 250 hours of classroom and hands on training before being assigned to an apparatus.



Fire Training Continued...

During summer months the Fargo Fire Department took advantage of the warm weather to gain experience in moving large volumes of water. Here firefighters are training on the use of one of our two aerial apparatus that is capable of flowing 1500 gallons per minute.



Apparatus Driver/Operator

Seven firefighters received training qualifying them for Fire Apparatus Operation. This is a 60 hour course that teaches firefighters how to safely maneuver and operate Fire Apparatus. All drivers with the FFD are required to attend this training prior to operating fire department apparatus.

In 2014 Train derailments were the hot topic and a number of plans were developed and training set up to evaluate the City's readiness. We set up training with BNSF and held a state wide tabletop exercise with the Department of Emergency Services and the Governor's office.





Onsite Emergency Preparedness

We worked with the largest construction project in Fargo to train on response to an onsite emergency and maintain a level of situational awareness as this project continues.





Warning Systems



This year we had some major changes to our emergency warning system. CodeRED our primary mass notification system was updated, and we added IPAWS to the mix. The Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS) is a modernization and integration of the nation's alert and warning infrastructure and will save time when time matters most, protecting life and property.

CodeRED emergency calls will now come from 701-364-2633; CodeRED non-emergency calls will come from 701-364-1277; and CodeRED weather calls will continue to come from (800) 566-9780, the release said. This year the City also has added four new outdoor warning sirens to our system, coverage to and every growing city.

The Fargo Fire Department maintains a Hazardous Materials Response Team based out of Fire Station 7. The team is comprised of 30 members divided between three shifts. They respond to Haz Mat calls in the city of Fargo and are contracted as the Southeast Regional Hazardous Materials Response Team for the state of North Dakota. As the regional team, we respond to Haz Mat incidents in Barnes, Cass, Dickey, Kidder, LaMoure, Logan, McInt osh, Ransom, Richland, Sargent, and Stutsman Counties. The primary funding of the Haz Mat Team comes from grants distributed by the ND Department of Emergency Services.



Hazardous Material Team Continued...



The Haz Mat Team trains on a monthly basis to maintain competency in a skill set derived from national standards and local needs. During the past year, Fargo Fire Department members logged 4151 hours of Haz Mat training. Our monthly training was supplemented with several special classes and drills.

In March, we participated in the ND Civil Support Team's readiness drill. The Civil Support Team is a group of 22 North Dakota National Guard Soldiers with extensive Haz Mat training and advanced equipment. Scenarios were held over several days simulating terrorist Haz Mat releases at a public arena and the City of Fargo Water Treatment Plant. Over the summer, we performed three drills with the Jamestown Fire Department's Haz Mat Operations Team. Jamestown is our support team for Haz Mat response in the SE region of North Dakota.

In May, two members were able to attend the International Association of Fire Chiefs Haz Mat Conference in Baltimore, MD. They were able to take classes from instructors who wrote the textbooks and national standards used by all Haz Mat teams.



In July, a grant from the ND Department of Emergency Services funded a Haz Mat IQ class. Haz Mat IQ is a system used to classify chemicals into groups to help team members determine the level and type of protection needed for entry into the contaminated area.

Also in July, BNSF provided training on the foam trailer staged at Station 6. Through a memo of understanding, the FFD houses a foam trailer for BNSF that the FFD can use as it see fit.

In October, the GATX railcar trainer was brought to Fargo for hands-on training by the Fargo Haz Mat team and other emergency responders from the area on the inner workings of all styles of railcars.

Throughout the fall, with funding provided by BNSF, we were able to send 14 members of the Haz Mat team to the Security and Emergency Response Training Center in Pueblo Colorado for a three day class on Crude By Rail. Team members were shown how to work with rail cars and how to extinguish crude oil fires during live fire evolutions.
