Percentage increase in EMS calls in 2020 compared to 2019's EMS calls














Planning Goal 3

The department needed to react quickly to continue to provide services through the COVID-19 pandemic










CALLS FOR SERVICE IN THE PAST TEN YEARS












RESPONSES BY PLANNING ZONE 2018-2020












CITY OF FARGO PLANNING ZONES





Fire Station 1 in Planning Zone 1



NUMBER OF RESPONSES BY TYPE (2018-2020)














MOST COMMON TYPES OF FIRE (2019-2020)












MOST COMMON STRUCTURE FIRE ORIGINS












TOTAL FIRE LOSS (DOLLAR VALUE)












TOTAL PRE-INCIDENT VALUE (DOLLAR VALUE)












TOTAL PROPERTY SAVED (DOLLAR VALUE)












TOTAL PROPERTY SAVED VS. PROPERTY LOST












TOTAL RESPONSE TIME: CALL TO FIRST UNIT ARRIVAL










2020 AVERAGE RESPONSE TIME
