EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Fargo Public Library made engagement with the community a priority in 2022. Library staff did a tremendous job providing extremely creative programs and events for all ages. The Design-a-Library-Card contest was a tremendous success with over seventy creative entries. The winning designs have become very popular with new patrons.

The library began an exciting new partnership with Fargo Public Schools that provided the opportunity for students in grades 6 to 12 to utilize their student ID as a library card. We had over 5,000 students take advantage of the opportunity. We look forward to expanding this program to Kindergarten through 5th graders in 2023.

The Red River Valley Kids Read program was another exciting collaboration between the Fargo Public Library and the libraries in Grand Forks, West Fargo, and Wahpeton. It was partially funded by a grant from the North Dakota Council on the Arts. The Fargo Public Library provided books to children in the community as well as to teachers and students in Fargo Public Schools.

Facility master planning was initiated to develop a plan for the continued viability of the current library locations and identify the scope and location of a potential additional location. The plan will be available in 2023 and will help identify priorities for library facilities for the next ten years.

The 2022 One Book One Community reading project which featured the Pulitzer Prize-winning book *The Night Watchman* by Louis Erdrich was a tremendously successful collaboration between the Fargo Public Library and the other libraries in the metro area. Community participation was tremendous, with over 600 attendees at the in-person author event.

The Fargo Public Library continued to see significant increases in visits and items checked out in 2022. Library visits across the three locations were up by over 25%. The Main Library saw the largest increase with 31% more visits than in 2021. The number of items checked out increased in 2022 by more than 7% over 2021, which is an increase of over 62,000 more items. It is exciting to see the continued strong support the library receives from the community.

While we hope our concerns are consistent with those of the people of Fargo, it is through communication with our fellow library patrons that we can remain better informed of community needs and desires. I urge every patron to communicate with the Library Board and help us better represent the community.



INNOVATIONS IN 2022



Teen, Kids', and Adult winning library card designs.

Read & Share is a new service aimed at increasing the public's access to books and reading. With the support of the Friends of the Fargo Public Library, Read & Share repurposes gently used books that were previously in the library's collection or were donated to the library. These books are available at partner organizations including Fargo Public Cass Health Clinic in the Women, Infants and Children Nutrition Program (WIC) office, several Little Free Libraries, and at community engagement events. Since launching the Read & Share service in August, 449 books were distributed to the members of the community.

Red River Valley Kids Read

A new community-read program for kids was held April 1–30. Titled Red River Valley Kids Read, the program is a collaboration between the public libraries of Fargo, West Fargo, Grand Forks, and Leach (Wahpeton) in ND, and the Moorhead Public Library in MN. Storm Warning by Elizabeth Raum, a middle-grade novel taking place during the historic Red River Valley Flood of 1997, was the highlighted book. A grant from the North Dakota Council on the Arts made it possible for the libraries to offer free copies of the books at area libraries and also to school librarians and 5th grade teachers in the Fargo Public School District. The grant also funded author visits at most of the partner libraries. Additional book-related programming rounded out the month.

The Fargo Public School Student ID Program is a collaboration with the Fargo Public Schools (FPS). Parents of FPS students in grades 6-12 are able to register their child for a Fargo Public Library card during the school registration process. Instead of receiving a physical library card, the child is able to use their FPS student ID to access the library's materials and services. Over 5,000 students were registered for library cards via fall 2022 FPS registration. Plans are underway to offer this program to all FPS students (K-grade 12) in fall 2023.

In September, the Fargo Public Library celebrated Library Card Sign Up Month by introducing Limited Edition Library Cards. The limited edition card designs were created by area artists of all ages who submitted art to the library's "Library Card Design Contest" during the month of April. The winning artists' designs in each age category were made into the new library cards. The winners, who were selected through public voting with over 2,400 votes received, are Ryan LeClair (Kids 12 and younger); Annie Ondracek (Teens 13 to 18); and Patty Fresonke-Twigg (Adults 19+). The new cards are available at all three library locations while supplies last.

Tech Help

Adult Services staff launched weekly Tech Help sessions at the Main Library in May of 2022. Patrons can register for 30-minute sessions with library staff to work on a specific tech problem or a question about a variety of online services, applications, or specific devices. If sessions are not booked, drop-ins are welcomed. Library staff have helped users work through such difficulties as untangling a business Facebook account from a personal account, setting up a smart watch, and keeping track of versions of a loved one's personal history manuscript, as well as getting numerous library patrons connected to eBooks and eAudiobooks.

New for 2022 in the Children's Dept.: Red River Valley Kids Read

In 2022, a new community read program for kids was held April 1 – 30. Titled "Red River Valley Kids Read," the program is a collaboration between the public libraries of Fargo, West Fargo, Grand Forks, and Leach (Wahpeton) in ND, and the Moorhead Public Library in MN. Storm Warning by Elizabeth Raum, a middle-grade novel taking place during the historic Red River Valley Flood of 1997, was the featured book. A grant from the ND Council on the Arts made it possible for the libraries to offer free copies of the books, and also supported author visits at the participating libraries. Additional book-related programming rounded out the month.



435 young children earned a book by reading 100 books with an adult.

Weekly Scavenger Hunts

The Children's Staff introduced weekly scavenger hunts during the summer of 2022 and it proved to be so popular, they were extended into the fall and winter. Each week library staff hid 10 themed images around the library for kids to search for and find. These activities elicited conversations and engagement between children and their caregivers, and provided continued incentive for families to visit the library regularly.

IN-LIBRARY JOB ASSISTANCE WITH JOB SERVICE ND



Erdrich's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel fictionalizes the real-life story of her grandfather, Patrick Gourneau, who worked as a night watchman in rural North Dakota and who carried the fight against Native dispossession all the way to Washington D.C.


