2022 Northern Narratives Rules, Information, and FAQs

The Fargo Public Library is excited to announce that its regional writing project *Northern Narratives* is moving into its sixth year! The FPL is calling for submissions to be included in the new volume from February 1, 2022 through March 31, 2022. *Northern Narratives* is looking for original written work by authors from the region.

If you're interested in submitting your work to *Northern Narratives*, thank you! Please read the rules, information, and frequently asked questions <u>thoroughly</u> before sending us anything, as not adhering to the guidelines may disqualify you. The Rules

- The submissions are open to any North Dakota resident or resident of the Fargo Public Library's reciprocal service area in the Lake Agassiz Regional Library System. Reciprocal Minnesota counties include Polk, Clearwater, Norman, Mahnomen, Clay, Becker, and Wilkin. Citizens of Rothsay are also eligible as part of the LARL System.
- Participants must be 13 years of age or older.
- All entries must be uploaded as a Word document (.doc or .docx) to <u>WuFoo</u> by March 31, 2022.
- Materials submitted to *Northern Narratives* may not be submitted to any other publication until after selections are announced.
- Authors may submit no more than one piece of fiction, one piece of nonfiction, and two
 poems. For details on submission categories, see below. Please make it clear in the
 submission form which category each piece belongs to.
- Submitted work must be original and previously unpublished, either in print or online. Work written in a personal journal and/or blog is still acceptable. By submitting to the project, you certify that you are the author and copyright holder of each piece you enter.
- All submissions must be edited and ready to print. Selections will not be edited by staff. Unedited works will be disqualified from the judging process.
- Our skies are big but our world is small, so please do not include any personal or identifying information in the body of your submission. Our judges cannot know whose works they're

reading in order to make objective decisions. For example, a creative nonfiction piece describing all the members of your family would be disqualified. However, please put your name at the beginning of the document, just as you'd like to see it if published. This will be redacted before given to the judges.

Submission Categories

Fiction

- *Fiction* is a form of writing that tells an imaginary story. Some or all of the events, places, people, and their actions within the story are made up. This includes very many styles, such as drama, comedy, romance, western, mystery, thriller, science fiction, fantasy, and so on.
- Fiction submissions must be a complete story, not part of a larger work.
- Fiction submissions should be in prose--in other words, your story must have fully formed paragraphs that flow together.
- We are accepting pieces of fiction between 1,000 and 6,000 words.
- An author may only submit one piece of fiction.

Nonfiction

- *Nonfiction* is a form of writing that aims to tell the truth regarding events, places, people, and their actions. This can include writing about your own life (autobiography or memoir), someone else's life (biography), travel, history, science, true crime, and more.
- Nonfiction submissions must be complete, not part of a larger work.
- Nonfiction submissions should be in prose--in other words, your piece must have fully formed paragraphs that flow together.
- We are accepting pieces of nonfiction between 1,000 and 6,000 words.
- An author may only submit one piece of nonfiction.

Poetry

- *Poetry* is a form of writing that uses various artistic tools to create strong impressions of a moment or an emotion. Tools may include rhyme, rhythm, line breaks, word placement, and many other kinds of wordplay.
- We are accepting poems that are 1,000 words or less.
- An author may submit up to two poems.

FAQs

Q. What is Northern Narratives?

A. *Northern Narratives* is a book published by the Fargo Public Library to highlight and preserve the writing of local and regional authors. This project aims to promote the sharing of our stories and the creation of content that is meaningful to our community.

Q. How will submissions be selected for publication?

A. There will be a juried selection for inclusion in the volume. Submissions will be judged by a selection committee based on both creativity and technical skill. The selection committee reserves the right to withhold publication at their discretion. All decisions are final.

Q. What is the deadline for submissions?

A. All submissions must be received by March 31, 2022.

Q. How should submissions be made?

A. Submissions must be uploaded to <u>WuFoo</u> as a Word document (.doc or .docx). Fiction, nonfiction, and poetry can be submitted at the same time on WuFoo, but must be uploaded as <u>separate</u> files. Each work must be fully edited. Please read the rules <u>thoroughly</u> before submitting to avoid disqualification.

Q. Should I include a Works Cited for my nonfiction writing?

A. If your piece includes research and/or quotes that necessitate having a Works Cited, yes, please include it as part of your submission.

Q. Since submitting, I have revised and updated my piece. May I resubmit it?

A. No. As stated in the rules, "All submissions must be edited and ready to print." Also upon submitting through WuFoo you are required to check a box indicating "Yes, everything is perfect." Therefore when we receive submissions we take you at your word that you are happy with your work. Please do not submit your writing if it is not ready because subsequent changes cannot be made.

Q. May I submit fanfiction?

A. If your piece includes characters or settings from properties still under copyright, no you may not submit it. If your piece includes characters or settings from properties no longer subject to copyright, that is fine.

To put it another way, we can't accept *Harry Potter* fanfiction. But if you decide to write a new twist on *Romeo and Juliet*, go for it.

Q. May I submit a chapter or excerpt from a novel or other larger work?

A. No, pieces must be complete within the set word limit of each category.

Q. May I submit a play or script?

A. No.

Q. When will I know if my piece has been selected for publication?

A. Authors will be notified in late spring or early summer. We promise you as soon as we know, you will know.

To that end, if your contact information changes after submitting please tell us as soon as possible so we can reach you when necessary.

Q. If published, who owns the copyright to my work?

A. After selected works are announced, all rights revert to the author. Materials may be submitted to other publishers at that time.

Selected submissions will be subject to "first rights" copyright. Any future publication will require the attribution: "First published in Northern Narratives – Fargo Public Library."

Q. Will I get a royalty check if my work is published?

A. No. The Fargo Public Library is a non-profit organization and will not make any money off the sale of *Northern Narratives*. Likewise, the Friends of the Fargo Public Library will not make a profit as the books will be sold at cost.

Q. How will *Northern Narratives* be distributed?

A. A full .pdf of the journal can be found online for free once printing is completed. In addition, bound copies of the 2022 *Northern Narratives* project will be available for purchase through the Friends of the Fargo Public Library.

Authors published in the journal will be gifted a free bound copy of *Northern Narratives* 2022 at the Northern Narratives 2022 Author Celebration Event. The NN 2022 Celebration Event date will be announced after selections are made. If it is not possible to hold an event, authors will be contacted with how to receive them instead.

There will also be bound copies of *Northern Narratives* entered into the Fargo Public Library's collection, which library patrons can borrow.
