Application for transfer of a class "FA-GOLF" Alcoholic Beverage License from Kjerbeersten, LLC d/b/a 19th Hole at Rose Creek to Up North Hospitality, LLC d/b/a CJ's Tavern, Located at 1500 East Rose Creek Parkway S, Fargo.

In accordance with Section 25-1505 of the Fargo Municipal Code, I have conducted an investigation into the character, reputation and fitness of the applicant(s) listed on the supplied application.

During this investigation, I examined the applicants' credit reports and public record criminal backgrounds.

The following information was discovered through this investigation:

Townsend, Cody

Criminal History -

A search of Fargo Police Department criminal records, North Dakota public records

(publicsearch.ndcourts.gov) and Minnesota public records (https://chs.state.mn.us)

showed no criminal history.

Credit History -

Townsend's credit history was reviewed. There are no prior bankruptcies, recent past due

accounts or debts turned over to collections.

Erpelding, Jordan

Criminal History -

A search of Fargo Police Department criminal records, North Dakota public records (publicsearch.ndcourts.gov) and Minnesota public records (https://chs.state.mn.us) showed he received an open container citation in 2014. This charge was disclosed on his application.

Credit History -

Jordan Erpelding's credit history was reviewed. There are no prior bankruptcies, or debts turned over to collections. Jordan has two credit card accounts that show they are currently 30 days delinquent. However, the monthly notation shows the delinquencies were 1-2 years ago and both accounts are current with one having zero balance.

Erpelding, Brett

Criminal History -

A search of Fargo Police Department criminal records, North Dakota public records (publicsearch.ndcourts.gov) and Minnesota public records (https://chs.state.mn.us) show Brett Erpelding was arrested for a DUI in June of 2012. Brett was also issued a citation for driving under suspension on the same day. Brett disclosed the DUI on the application (he indicates it happened in 2013) but does not mention the DUS citation. Brett disclosed that his driver's license was suspended after the DUI arrest, but it must have also been suspended at the time of the arrest to receive the citation. ND public records shows this DUS citation was dismissed. Both police records and ND public records show Brett pled guilty to "smoking in a prohibited location" in 2015. According to the case report, Brett was an employee at E-Cig Empire and his friends were smoking inside of the shop during business hours. This charge is a criminal infraction in ND. This charge was not disclosed on the application.

Credit History -

Brett Erpelding's credit history was reviewed. There are no prior bankruptcies, or debts turned over to collections. Brett Erpelding has two accounts that were 30 days past due, but are now both current.

Erpelding, Bradley

Criminal History -

A search of Fargo Police Department criminal records, North Dakota public records (publicsearch.ndcourts.gov) and Minnesota public records (https://chs.state.mn.us) showed Bradley was arrested for a DUI in 2000. This charge was disclosed on the application. North Dakota public record also shows Bradley received a "hunting without non-resident license" in 1996. The disposition is listed as "deferred dismissal".

Credit History -

Bradley Erpelding's credit history was reviewed. There are no recent past due accounts or debts turned over to collections. Bradley disclosed on his application that he filed for bankruptcy about 15 years ago. This bankruptcy did not show up on my credit report.

Investigation Notes

This application is for the transfer of a class "A-GOLF" alcoholic beverage license (Authorizes the licensee to sell beer, wine, and spirits, on sale only and located on a 9 hole or more USGA golf course. A bar is allowed and 25% of sales must be from food from April-October, and 50% of sales must be from food from November-March) from Kjerbeersten, LLC d/b/a 19th Hole at Rose Creek to Up North Hospitality, LLC d/b/a CJ's Tavern.

I spoke with Brett Erpelding over the phone with regards to the missing information on his application. I told him I found some criminal charges that were not disclosed on his application. I brought up the smoking in a public space charge. Brett responded asking if it was 2007. I said it was from 2015 and asked if he remembered the charge. Brett said he did not. I read him the circumstances from the police report and added that the charge would have required him to appear in court and Brett said he still doesn't remember, but said he probably did it. I also asked Brett if his driver's license has ever been suspended other than the DUI noted on the application. Brett said it probably was from driving without insurance. This would explain the DUS citation issued during the DUI arrest in 2012.

I asked Brett why these charges were not disclosed on the application. Brett said he did not fill out the application, adding that one of the other applicants, maybe Cody, must have filled it out for him. I asked if this co-applicant asked him for the correct information to put on the application for him and he said they did not, and they must have looked it up or just remembered the information. I followed up asking if he signed the documents that have his signature and he said he did, but couldn't remember what he signed exactly. A closer review all of the handwritten applications shows it's likely that all 4 applications were filled out by individual people, and the person who filled out Brett's portion did not complete any of the other paperwork.

I called Cody Townsend to talk about Brett's application. Cody said he received a text message from Brett after I talked to him saying Brett put the wrong date of his DUI in the application. I asked Cody if he filled out Brett's paperwork for him and he said he did not, and Brett did fill it out himself. Cody was not able to give an explanation of why Brett would have been untruthful about not completing the application, other than it's possible he did not remember filling it out.

Business Location

CJ's Tavern will be located at 1500 East Rose Creek Parkway S at the Rose Creek Golf Course. There are no other businesses with an alcoholic beverage license in the area.

Conclusion

This background investigation is being forwarded for your review and recommendation to the City of Fargo Liquor Control Board.

In accordance with Section 25-1505 of the Fargo Municipal Code, I have conducted an investigation into the character, reputation and fitness of the applicant(s) listed on the supplied application.

During this investigation, I examined the applicants' credit reports and public record criminal backgrounds.

The following information was discovered through this investigation:

Vega, Sandra

Criminal History -

A search of Fargo Police Department criminal records, North Dakota public records (publicsearch.ndcourts.gov) and Minnesota public records (https://chs.state.mn.us) showed Vega was cited/arrested for minor in consumption in West Fargo in 2005. This charge was disclosed on the application. Vega has a valid ND Driver's License. Vega did not list the ND DL on the application. Vega only listed MN and FL. Vega's MN driver's license shows "no license" "changed state of record".

Credit History -

Vega's credit history was reviewed. There are no prior bankruptcies or debts turned over to collections. Vega has one account that was 60 days past due on three occasions, and one account that was 30 days past due on two occasions.

Investigation Notes

This application is for a class "F" alcoholic beverage license (Authorizes the licensee to sell beer, wine, and spirits "on-sale" only. Bar is not allowed. Requires 50% or more of its annual gross receipts from the sale of prepared meals and not alcoholic beverages) for El Vaqueros.

I interviewed Vega over the phone. I asked Vega why I was able to see a valid ND driver's license but it was not listed on the application. Vega said she had to go to Mexico for an emergency in 2020 and needed a passport. She went to the ND DOT to get an ID card while she was staying with her sister in West Fargo. There must have been a miscommunication and ND issued her a ND DL, which in turn canceled her MN DL. Vega was unaware her MN DL was no longer valid and she now had a ND DL. Vega, who is a Minnesota resident now, was going to go to the MN DMV to try and fix the issue.

I asked Vega about the recent missed payments on her credit accounts. Vega said the recent missed payments were on her mortgage. She thought she had signed up for auto-payment, but nothing was coming out of her account. She said payments were missed at the time, but the account is current now.

I brought up the minor in consumption charge that she disclosed on her application. Vega admitted to the charge again and said she has kept her record clean since.

Finally, I mentioned I saw in the application that her children currently serve at the restaurant. Vega's children are both under the age of 18. 

Commissioners:

At the November 27, 2023, commission meeting, a public hearing was held regarding the appeal of a Board of Adjustment decision regarding a Land Management Permit at 338 9th Ave S. The motion to support the Land Management Permit was declared lost for the lack of a majority. At the December 11 meeting, commissioners voted to reconsider this permit request, and hold a public hearing.

The packet submitted at the November 27 meeting included:

- License agreement for the use and maintenance of the city owned lot at 338 9th Ave S.
- Certificate of Liability Insurance.
- Public Works Project Evaluation Committee report of action.

Chapter 11-08 of the Fargo Municipal Code, adopted in 2006, does allow vegetation to exceed 8" in height to allow property owners or occupants an opportunity to establish prairie wildflowers, grasses, and other pollinator plants as alternatives to traditional Kentucky bluegrass, as long as there is a Land Management Plan/Permit in place.

3 years ago, the owners at 340 9th Ave S, took it upon themselves and contracted PRI (now MN Native Landscapes) to establish wildflower and native grass plantings on this city owned lot. Currently, a mowing is scheduled for spring 2024.

Prairie plantings in an urban area are a challenge, and require unique maintenance strategies at different times throughout the growing season, managed by an individual or contractor knowledgeable in this type of landscaping. It also requires a commitment by the owner or occupant. This commitment is reflected in the Land Management Plan/Permit and in this case, the use and maintenance agreement.

Typical maintenance needs include:

3-5 site visits per season.

- Full spring or fall mowing as needed
- Spot herbicide
- Herbicide wicking
- Hand weeding
- Spot mowing
- Reseeding/Replanting as needed

Cost examples:

- Veterans Boulevard roundabouts: \$1500.00 for 2023. City funded.
- 338 9th Ave S: \$3025.00 (2021-2023; included site prep, seeding, wildflower planting and maintenance). *Privately funded.*

LICENSE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into by and between the City of Fargo, North Dakota, a municipal corporation, whose address is 225 4th Street North, Fargo, North Dakota, hereinafter referred to as "Licensor", and Darrell Ross and/or Kimberly Wallen, owners of the property located at 340 9th Avenue South, Fargo, North Dakota, hereinafter referred to as "Licensee", whether one or more.

WHEREAS, Licensee desires to secure access to the city of Fargo owned lot
South of and adjacent to Licensee's lot for the purpose of maintaining and managing the
prairie planting; and

WHEREAS, City is willing to allow Licensee to secure a permit for the maintenance of the prairie planting on the lot adjacent to Licensee's lot for this purpose.

NOW THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

1. Licensee is the owner of the adjacent property, legally described as follows:

The East Half (E ½) of Lot Six (6), all of Lot Seven (7), except the South 51' of said Lots, Block Four (4), Woodruff's Addition to the City of Fargo, Cass County, State of North Dakota.

2. The description of the premises for the purposes of this License is as follows:

Lot Six (6), Block Four (4), Woodruffs Addition to the City of Fargo, situate in the County of Cass and the State of North Dakota.

Property address: 338 9th Avenue South, Fargo, ND 58103

- 3. <u>Use of Property and Prohibited Activities</u>. Licensee is hereby granted access to, and use of, the Fargo owned lot for the sole purpose of maintaining the property, including but not limited to mowing, trimming, seeding, weed management, and watering in accordance with the terms of a Prairie Management Permit issued by the City of Fargo.
- 4. <u>Insurance</u>. Licensee agrees to carry general liability insurance in an amount not less than \$500,000, and shall provide Licensor a Certificate of Insurance naming the City of Fargo as an additional insured. Such insurance must be maintained during the term of this agreement and any extension agreed to thereafter. Failure to provide and maintain the necessary insurance shall result in an immediate termination of the access and use granted herein.
- Non-reimbursement of Damages. Licensee acknowledges that they shall be responsible for all costs associated with repairing any damages to permissible improvements made to the property.
- 6. <u>Term.</u> The term of this license agreement shall be for a period of 3 years. This license agreement may be extended by the parties, in writing signed by the parties,

for additional 3-year terms, such extensions to be recorded in the County of Cass, State of North Dakota. City reserves the right to terminate this license agreement, with or without cause, at any time, without costs or payments to Licensee. City shall endeavor to provide Licensee at least 10 days' Notice of Intent to Terminate License Agreement, but shall have no obligation to provide such notice.

7. Non-transferability. This license agreement shall be personal to the Licensee, whether one or more, hereto so long as Licensee remains in possession and control of the adjacent lot. Any modifications, assignment or successors may request to enter into a new license agreement with the City for the purpose stated herein, such permission to not be unreasonably withheld. The parties agree and understand that this license agreement shall be recorded, at Licensee's cost and expense.

The Committee reviewed the attached correspondence from City Forester, Scott Liudahl, regarding a proposed License Agreement for the City owned lot at 338 9th Avenue South.

Three years ago, property owners at 340 9th Avenue South, Darrell Ross and Kimberly Wallen, contracted with MN Native Landscapes to install a prairie landscape/pollinator garden on the City owned vacant lot located at 338 9th Avenue South. Three years later, it is well established and being actively managed, and in good condition.

Per ordinance, anything growing over 8" in height is not allowed unless there is a Land Management Permit (LMP) in place. Environmental Health received a complaint regarding the un-mowed lot. After consulting with Public Works and Environmental Health staff, we felt it was appropriate to pursue the LMP after the fact. One appeal was received and will be heard at the next Board of Adjustment meeting.

With guidance from Nancy Morris, a proposed License Agreement has been established. Darrell has agreed to maintain the City owner property per the LMP guidelines and License Agreement.

The Committee discussed their support of agreements such as this that allow, under certain conditions, neighboring property owners to maintain City owned land. The Committee further discussed current and missing language in the proposed License Agreement. The Committee felt that the insurance requirements (\$1 million general liability) was likely in excess and could be a deterrent to this and potentially future property owners. The Committee also discussed the need to include language pertaining to non-reimbursement of damages

On a motion by Ben Dow, seconded by Brenda Derrig, the Committee voted to approve the proposed License Agreement for the City owned lot at 338 9th Avenue South with the condition that Scott Liudahl work with the City Attorney to include non-reimbursement of damages language and to consider reducing insurance requirements.

RECOMMENDED MOTION

Concur with the recommendations of PWPEC and approve the License Agreement for the City owned lot at 338 9th Avenue South.

October 24, 2023 Board of Adjustment - Findings of Fact

A full and complete application was filed by K. Wallin and D. Ross on June 27, 2023 seeking a Land Management Permit at 338 9th Avenue South to allow plantings to exceed the maximum 8-inch height of grasses as required in 11-0809 of the Fargo Municipal Code.

The Land Management Plan / Permits are intended to promote native and other plants and grasses in their landscape, including pollinator gardens/plants, vs traditional Kentucky blue grass.

As outlined in the Fargo Municipal Code 11-0810, the City Forester reviewed and approved the application and mailed notification of the approval to property owners within 200 feet of the subject property. Neighboring property owners were provided the option to appeal the City Forester decision to the Board of Adjustment as outlined in a letter dated July 17, 2023.

A written letter of protest was submitted via email to the City Forester on August 8, 2023 by M. Sietz.

The Board of Adjustment considered the Appeal of an Administration Decision at the October 24, 2023 meeting. The Land Development Code, as outlined in the §20-0916, outlines how the Board of Adjustment is to consider an Appeal of an Administrative Decision:

Appeals of Administrative Decisions shall be taken to the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment shall grant to the administrative official's decision a presumption of correctness, placing the burden of persuasion of error on the appellant. In exercising the appeal power, the Board of Adjustment shall have all the powers of the official from whom the appeal is taken, and the Board of Adjustment may reverse or affirm wholly or partly or may modify the decision being appealed. If the Board of Adjustment determines that it is necessary to obtain additional evidence in order to resolve the matter, it shall remand the appeal to the official from whom the appeal is taken, with directions to obtain such evidence and to reconsider the decision in light of such evidence. A concurring vote of four members of the Board of Adjustment shall be necessary to reverse any order, requirement, decision, or determination of an administrative official.

The Board of Adjustment at the regular meeting on October 24, 2023 voted 5-0, unanimously to Affirm staff's decision to Approve the Land Management Permit / Plan application for 338 9th Avenue South.

Appeals from the action of the Board of Adjustment may be taken to the Board of City Commissioners by filing an appeal with the Zoning Administrator.

On October 25, 2023, an application to Appeal a Board of Adjustment was submitted to the Zoning Administrator Decision by M. Seitz.

Appeal of a Board of Adjustment Decision

The Board of City Commissioners shall consider the application for a Land Management Permit / Plan as a new matter in a public hearing and, at the close of the public hearing, act to approve or deny the original application.

Chapter 11 of the Fargo Municipal Code requires property owners to remove noxious or other weeds, and to maintain the growth of grass so it does not exceed 8" in length. However, these requirements do not apply to a property where the owner or person in control of the property has applied for and obtained a land management plan/permit (LMP) from the city allowing grass growth to exceed 8" in length. This allows property owners the opportunity to promote native and other plants and grasses in their landscape, including pollinator gardens/plants, vs. traditional Kentucky blue grass.

This permit process includes:

- Written plan, and map, identifying the areas on the property
- Description of the plants
- Management and maintenance techniques to be utilized
- 200' mailing to adjacent owners opportunity to appeal
- Agreeing to mow or cut if ordered to do so

After reviewing the information provided by the applicants at 340 9th Ave S, Darrell Ross and Kimberly Wallen (the adjacent property owners), the plan/permit has been approved. Per the notification process, one appeal was received.

Three years ago, knowing it was not their property but also knowing nothing was going to be done with it, Darrell and Kimberly contracted with MN Native Landscapes, formerly Prairie Restorations Inc., to install the prairie landscape on this piece of city property. Three years later, it is well established. Prior to proceeding with the LMP, this was discussed with public works and environmental health staff.

The attached information includes: related ordinance, approved LMP, supporting information provided by the applicant, site location, photos, and the appeal.

In working with Nancy Morris, an agreement has been developed, allowing Darrell and Kimberly to use and maintain the property. This agreement is currently working its way through the Public Works Project Evaluation Committee, and will go to city commission for final approval.

Suggested motion:

Support the approved land management plan/permit as presented, and deny the appeal.

No stagnant water shall be allowed to stand or remain, noxious or other weeds, or grass allowed to grow more than eight inches (8") in length upon or along the line of any railroad, street, highway, alley, public place, along or upon any vacant or other lot or real estate parcel, public or private, or other place within the city. For purposes of this article, "noxious weeds" shall mean any species of plant or vegetation recognized by the North Dakota State Weed Board as a noxious weed.

11-0806. - Duty of property owners to control stagnant water, fill excavations, remove dirt piles, noxious or other weeds, tall grasses.

It shall be the duty of all property owners, occupants, or persons having control over private property to remove or drain stagnant water, to fill excavations, to remove dirt piles, to remove noxious or other weeds, and to maintain the growth of grass on such property so that it does not exceed eight inches (8") in length. These requirements apply to areas along and upon any railroad, street, highway, alley, public place or along or upon any vacant or other lot or place within the city.

11-0807. - Failure to drain stagnant water, fill excavations, remove dirt piles, remove weeds, maintain grass.

Notice of a violation of this article shall be mailed to the record property owner as shown in the property tax records maintained in the city assessor's office, upon any agent of the property owner, and upon any occupant of the property when appropriate. The owner, agent, tenant or person in charge of the property shall take appropriate action to remove the stagnant water, fill excavations, remove dirt piles, fill holes or depressions, cut and/or keep down the growth of any noxious or other weeds, and maintain all grasses not to exceed eight inches (8") in height, as directed by the health department within the specified period of time. If the property owner, tenant, or agent fails to take such appropriate action within the time period as directed by the health department, the health department shall have authority to remove or drain off any stagnant water, fill all excavations, holes, or depressions, and cut or mow any noxious or other weeds and grasses.

11-0808. - Control of noxious and other weeds, grass—exceptions to general requirements.

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The requirements in this article requiring control of noxious and other weeds and grasses do not apply to property where the owner or person in control of the property has applied for and obtained a land management plan permit from the city allowing grass growth to exceed eight inches (8") in length.

11-0809. - Land management plan permit—Issuance.

To obtain a land management plan permit, the applicant must submit a written plan identifying the specific area where the plantings or grass is planned to exceed eight inches (8") in length, a statement of intent and purpose for the area, a drawing, plot plan and/or survey showing the location of the planting on the applicant's property, a detailed description of the plant types and plant succession involved, and specific management and maintenance techniques to be employed. The land management plan must include provisions for maintaining plantings at a length not to exceed eight inches (8") in the area between the sidewalk and the street, or a strip not less than fifteen feet (15') adjacent to the street where there is no sidewalk, as well as a strip not less than four feet (4') adjacent to neighboring property lines unless waived in writing by the abutting property owner on the side so affected. Any such waiver of the requirements shall be affixed to the application and plan. No area of city owned property within any street right-of-way may be included within a land management plan. This shall include the property between the sidewalk and the street and not less than fifteen (15) feet adjacent to the street where there is no sidewalk. As a condition of receiving approval of a land management permit, the applicant agrees and understands to mow or cut any grass or plantings when ordered to due so by the health officer or any other city official or designee thereof.

11-0810. - Permit application—Review.

An application for a land management plan permit shall be on a form provided by the city shall be submitted to the forestry department. A copy of the application shall be mailed to each of the owners of record, as listed in the office of the City Assessor, who are owners of the property situated in whole or in part within 200 feet of the boundaries of the properties affected. The application and any related information shall be considered by the city forester. The city forester shall have authority, after reviewing all appropriate materials and information, to approve or deny the application. An applicant who has had a permit denied or revoked, or an affected property owner in the event a permit is granted, may appeal the decision of the city forester to the board of adjustment. Such appeal must be made in writing within fifteen (15) days of the city forester's decision and shall be heard at a regular meeting of the board of adjustment.

11-0811. - Owner or occupant's responsibilities concerning land management plan.

An owner or occupant receiving a land management plan permit agrees to maintain any grass or plantings so as not to present hazards or to create a nuisance for adjoining properties, or to persons or vehicles traveling on the public ways. An owner or occupant receiving such permit also agrees to manage and maintain such grass or plantings such that they do not present a hazard to structures on affected land and to maintain such plantings as to enhance the appearance of the property on which they are located.

11-0812. - Authority of city to manage and control grass and plantings within an area included within a land management plan.

Notwithstanding issuance of a land management pan permit, the city may order the cutting of such grass or plantings included within a land management plan at any time the city determines that the growth may constitute a fire or safety hazard as to cause danger to the safety of the inhabitants of any residential structure on located on the premises or to the citizens and residents of the neighborhood. Any costs incurred by the city shall be charged to the owner, occupant, or person in control of the property as authorized under this article.

F. Management:

- Management (maintenance) plays a vital role in the eventual success of any native landscape installation, especially during the establishment period. Active management of your native landscape is highly recommended to give the project the best opportunity for long term success.
- 2. Due to nature of this project, the maintenance requirements are somewhat different when compared to larger, seeded restorations. These "garden-like" sites are best maintained utilizing hand weeding techniques accomplished by personnel adept at identifying native and non-native plants.

Thank you for allowing us to provide our comments regarding the complaint filed by one neighbor. My name is Dr. Darrell Ross. I am the co-owner of 340 9th Ave S., Fargo, ND.

We take full responsibility for not obtaining a permit prior to installing an urban prairie garden in 2021. This comment is to provide context for this oversight. We contracted with Minnesota Native Landscapes Inc. (MNL) to install the prairie. They work with the city of Fargo to install urban prairies on city property along the Red River Trail. In doing so, we incorrectly assumed that they would have the permits either in place or would have gone through the process to obtain them to install an urban prairie. We are not blaming them, rather providing context for our actions and that we should have confirmed this assumption.

The plan to establish and maintain the urban prairie is included in the land management plan developed with the Fargo City Forester, Scott Liudahl, please see Appendix I.

This is not an environmental tragedy. The plants are not noxious weeds. They are intentionally selected plants that are native to this region of North Dakota. I won't go into all of the ecological benefits because you can see the letter to the editor of the Forum from Audobon Great Plains, see Appendix II, but will mention that the pocket prairie is approximately 50 feet from the floodwaters embankment. The City of Fargo has been working with Audubon Great Plains (formerly Audubon Dakota) through their Bird Friendly Communities/Community Conservation program to establish more native vegetation within Fargo city limits.

My name is Dr. Kimberly Wallin. I am the co-owner of 340 9th Ave S., Fargo, ND. Thank you for allowing us to provide additional information regarding the complaint filed by one neighbor.

The person filing the complaint and appealing the decision of the Board of Adjustments misled the city officials by stating they represented 10 neighbors. This is not true for two reasons: 1) There are not 10 adults, excluding myself and Dr. Ross, that live within 200 feet of the pocket prairie; 2) The neighbors to the east of us on 9th Ave S are neutral and the neighbors to the west of us support the pocket prairie, please see signatures of our neighbors in Appendix III. Also included are numerous emails from people who currently reside or previously resided in the Fargo area supportive of the pocket prairie.

The point about preventing people from walking through is misleading. There is nowhere for a person to go since 2 of the 4 sides are private property. Contrary, in collaboration with our neighbors we purchased stepping stones and placed them from their property to the west of us so that they could easily walk through the prairie. Anyone with permission of that neighbor can walk from his property through the prairie to the city owned turfgrass lot on 10th Ave S.



LICENSE AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, Licensee desires to secure access to the city of Fargo owned lot South of and adjacent to Licensee's lot for the purpose of maintaining and managing the prairie planting; and

WHEREAS, City is willing to allow Licensee to secure a permit for the maintenance of the prairie planting on the lot adjacent to Licensee's lot for this purpose.

NOW THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

1. Licensee is the owner of the adjacent property, legally described as follows:

The East Half (E ½) of Lot Six (6), all of Lot Seven (7), except the South 51' of said Lots, Block Four (4), Woodruff's Addition to the City of Fargo, Cass County, State of North Dakota.

2. The description of the premises for the purposes of this License is as follows:

- 3. <u>Use of Property and Prohibited Activities</u>. Licensee is hereby granted access to, and use of, the Fargo owned lot for the sole purpose of maintaining the property, including but not limited to mowing, trimming, seeding, weed management, and watering in accordance with the terms of a Prairie Management Permit issued by the City of Fargo.
- 4. <u>Insurance</u>. Licensee agrees to carry general liability insurance in an amount not less than \$500,000, and shall provide Licensor a Certificate of Insurance naming the City of Fargo as an additional insured. The Committee reviewed the attached correspondence from City Forester, Scott Liudahl, regarding a proposed License Agreement for the City owned lot at 338 9th Avenue South.

Three years ago, property owners at 340 9th Avenue South, Darrell Ross and Kimberly Wallen, contracted with MN Native Landscapes to install a prairie landscape/pollinator garden on the City owned vacant lot located at 338 9th Avenue South. Three years later, it is well established and being actively managed, and in good condition.

Per ordinance, anything growing over 8" in height is not allowed unless there is a Land Management Permit (LMP) in place. Environmental Health received a complaint regarding the un-mowed lot. After consulting with Public Works and Environmental Health staff, we felt it was appropriate to pursue the LMP after the fact. One appeal was received and will be heard at the next Board of Adjustment meeting.

With guidance from Nancy Morris, a proposed License Agreement has been established. Darrell has agreed to maintain the City owner property per the LMP guidelines and License Agreement.

The Committee discussed their support of agreements such as this that allow, under certain conditions, neighboring property owners to maintain City owned land. The Committee further discussed current and missing language in the proposed License Agreement. The Committee felt that the insurance requirements (\$1 million general liability) was likely in excess and could be a deterrent to this and potentially future property owners. The Committee also discussed the need to include language pertaining to non-reimbursement of damages.

On a motion by Ben Dow, seconded by Brenda Derrig, the Committee voted to approve the proposed License Agreement for the City owned lot at 338 9th Avenue South with the condition that Scott Liudahl work with the City Attorney to include non-reimbursement of damages language and to consider reducing insurance requirements.

RECOMMENDED MOTION

Concur with the recommendations of PWPEC and approve the License Agreement for the City owned lot at 338 9th Avenue South.

October 24, 2023 Board of Adjustment - Findings of Fact

A full and complete application was filed by K. Wallin and D. Ross on June 27, 2023 seeking a Land Management Permit at 338 9th Avenue South to allow plantings to exceed the maximum 8-inch height of grasses as required in 11-0809 of the Fargo Municipal Code.

The Land Management Plan / Permits are intended to promote native and other plants and grasses in their landscape, including pollinator gardens/plants, vs traditional Kentucky blue grass.

As outlined in the Fargo Municipal Code 11-0810, the City Forester reviewed and approved the application and mailed notification of the approval to property owners within 200 feet of the subject property. Neighboring property owners were provided the option to appeal the City Forester decision to the Board of Adjustment as outlined in a letter dated July 17, 2023.

A written letter of protest was submitted via email to the City Forester on August 8, 2023 by M. Sietz.

The Board of Adjustment considered the Appeal of an Administration Decision at the October 24, 2023 meeting. The Land Development Code, as outlined in the §20-0916, outlines how the Board of Adjustment is to consider an Appeal of an Administrative Decision:

Appeals of Administrative Decisions shall be taken to the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment shall grant to the administrative official's decision a presumption of correctness, placing the burden of persuasion of error on the appellant. In exercising the appeal power, the Board of Adjustment shall have all the powers of the official from whom the appeal is taken, and the Board of Adjustment may reverse or affirm wholly or partly or may modify the decision being appealed. If the Board of Adjustment determines that it is necessary to obtain additional evidence in order to resolve the matter, it shall remand the appeal to the official from whom the appeal is taken, with directions to obtain such evidence and to reconsider the decision in light of such evidence. A concurring vote of four members of the Board of Adjustment shall be necessary to reverse any order, requirement, decision, or determination of an administrative official.

The Board of Adjustment at the regular meeting on October 24, 2023 voted 5-0, unanimously to Affirm staff's decision to Approve the Land Management Permit / Plan application for 338 9th Avenue South.

Appeals from the action of the Board of Adjustment may be taken to the Board of City Commissioners by filing an appeal with the Zoning Administrator.

On October 25, 2023, an application to Appeal a Board of Adjustment was submitted to the Zoning Administrator Decision by M. Seitz.

Appeal of a Board of Adjustment Decision

The Board of City Commissioners shall consider the application for a Land Management Permit / Plan as a new matter in a public hearing and, at the close of the public hearing, act to approve or deny the original application.

Chapter 11 of the Fargo Municipal Code requires property owners to remove noxious or other weeds, and to maintain the growth of grass so it does not exceed 8" in length. However, these requirements do not apply to a property where the owner or person in control of the property has applied for and obtained a land management plan/permit (LMP) from the city allowing grass growth to exceed 8" in length. This allows property owners the opportunity to promote native and other plants and grasses in their landscape, including pollinator gardens/plants, vs. traditional Kentucky blue grass.

This permit process includes:

- Written plan, and map, identifying the areas on the property
- Description of the plants
- Management and maintenance techniques to be utilized
- 200' mailing to adjacent owners opportunity to appeal
- Agreeing to mow or cut if ordered to do so

After reviewing the information provided by the applicants at 340 9th Ave S, Darrell Ross and Kimberly Wallen (the adjacent property owners), the plan/permit has been approved. Per the notification process, one appeal was received.

Three years ago, knowing it was not their property but also knowing nothing was going to be done with it, Darrell and Kimberly contracted with MN Native Landscapes, formerly Prairie Restorations Inc., to install the prairie landscape on this piece of city property. Three years later, it is well established. Prior to proceeding with the LMP, this was discussed with public works and environmental health staff.

The attached information includes: related ordinance, approved LMP, supporting information provided by the applicant, site location, photos, and the appeal.

In working with Nancy Morris, an agreement has been developed, allowing Darrell and Kimberly to use and maintain the property. This agreement is currently working its way through the Public Works Project Evaluation Committee, and will go to city commission for final approval.

Suggested motion:

Support the approved land management plan/permit as presented, and deny the appeal.

No stagnant water shall be allowed to stand or remain, noxious or other weeds, or grass allowed to grow more than eight inches (8") in length upon or along the line of any railroad, street, highway, alley, public place, along or upon any vacant or other lot or real estate parcel, public or private, or other place within the city. For purposes of this article, "noxious weeds" shall mean any species of plant or vegetation recognized by the North Dakota State Weed Board as a noxious weed.

11-0806. - Duty of property owners to control stagnant water, fill excavations, remove dirt piles, noxious or other weeds, tall grasses.

It shall be the duty of all property owners, occupants, or persons having control over private property to remove or drain stagnant water, to fill excavations, to remove dirt piles, to remove noxious or other weeds, and to maintain the growth of grass on such property so that it does not exceed eight inches (8") in length. These requirements apply to areas along and upon any railroad, street, highway, alley, public place or along or upon any vacant or other lot or place within the city.

11-0807. - Failure to drain stagnant water, fill excavations, remove dirt piles, remove weeds, maintain grass.

Notice of a violation of this article shall be mailed to the record property owner as shown in the property tax records maintained in the city assessor's office, upon any agent of the property owner, and upon any occupant of the property when appropriate. The owner, agent, tenant or person in charge of the property shall take appropriate action to remove the stagnant water, fill excavations, remove dirt piles, fill holes or depressions, cut and/or keep down the growth of any noxious or other weeds, and maintain all grasses not to exceed eight inches (8") in height, as directed by the health department within the specified period of time. If the property owner, tenant, or agent fails to take such appropriate action within the time period as directed by the health department, the health department shall have authority to remove or drain off any stagnant water, fill all excavations, holes, or depressions, and cut or mow any noxious or other weeds and grasses.

11-0808. - Control of noxious and other weeds, grass—exceptions to general requirements.



The requirements in this article requiring control of noxious and other weeds and grasses do not apply to property where the owner or person in control of the property has applied for and obtained a land management plan permit from the city allowing grass growth to exceed eight inches (8") in length.

11-0809. - Land management plan permit---Issuance.

To obtain a land management plan permit, the applicant must submit a written plan identifying the specific area where the plantings or grass is planned to exceed eight inches (8") in length, a statement of intent and purpose for the area, a drawing, plot plan and/or survey showing the location of the planting on the applicant's property, a detailed description of the plant types and plant succession involved, and specific management and maintenance techniques to be employed. The land management plan must include provisions for maintaining plantings at a length not to exceed eight inches (8") in the area between the sidewalk and the street, or a strip not less than fifteen feet (15') adjacent to the street where there is no sidewalk, as well as a strip not less than four feet (4') adjacent to neighboring property lines unless waived in writing by the abutting property owner on the side so affected. Any such waiver of the requirements shall be affixed to the application and plan. No area of city owned property within any street right-of-way may be included within a land management plan. This shall include the property between the sidewalk and the street and not less than fifteen (15) feet adjacent to the street where there is no sidewalk. As a condition of receiving approval of a land management permit, the applicant agrees and understands to mow or cut any grass or plantings when ordered to due so by the health officer or any other city official or designee thereof.

11-0810. - Permit application—Review.

An application for a land management plan permit shall be on a form provided by the city shall be submitted to the forestry department. A copy of the application shall be mailed to each of the owners of record, as listed in the office of the City Assessor, who are owners of the property situated in whole or in part within 200 feet of the boundaries of the properties affected. The application and any related information shall be considered by the city forester. The city forester shall have authority, after reviewing all appropriate materials and information, to approve or deny the application. An applicant who has had a permit denied or revoked, or an affected property owner in the event a permit is granted, may appeal the decision of the city forester to the board of adjustment. Such appeal must be made in writing within fifteen (15) days of the city forester's decision and shall be heard at a regular meeting of the board of adjustment.

11-0811. - Owner or occupant's responsibilities concerning land management plan.

An owner or occupant receiving a land management plan permit agrees to maintain any grass or plantings so as not to present hazards or to create a nuisance for adjoining properties, or to persons or vehicles traveling on the public ways. An owner or occupant receiving such permit also agrees to manage and maintain such grass or plantings such that they do not present a hazard to structures on affected land and to maintain such plantings as to enhance the appearance of the property on which they are located.

11-0812. - Authority of city to manage and control grass and plantings within an area included within a land management plan.

Notwithstanding issuance of a land management pan permit, the city may order the cutting of such grass or plantings included within a land management plan at any time the city determines that the growth may constitute a fire or safety hazard as to cause danger to the safety of the inhabitants of any residential structure on located on the premises or to the citizens and residents of the neighborhood. Any costs incurred by the city shall be charged to the owner, occupant, or person in control of the property as authorized under this article.

F. Management:

- Management (maintenance) plays a vital role in the eventual success of any native landscape installation, especially during the establishment period. Active management of your native landscape is highly recommended to give the project the best opportunity for long term success.
- Due to nature of this project, the maintenance requirements are somewhat different when compared to larger, seeded restorations. These "garden-like" sites are best maintained utilizing hand weeding techniques accomplished by personnel adept at identifying native and non-native plants.





Dear Editor,

Regarding the recent article titled "Fargo to cut down prairie garden maintained by NDSU professor after neighbor's complaint" from Monday, December 4th, I am writing to express my disappointment regarding the recent decision by the Fargo City Commissioners on November 27, where a 3-2 vote denied a permit for the native planting to continue in a vacant lot off 9th St. This decision has far-reaching consequences, particularly in the context of promoting pollinator habitat, preserving biodiversity in our community, and supporting natural solutions for flood prevention.

As a regional Communications Manager for the National Audubon Society, I eagerly look at this as an opportunity to educate our community and Fargo City Commission, on opportunities found in native prairie plantings. The significance of native plantings in urban spaces cannot be overstated. As a National non-profit conservation organization, we have seen the beneficial impact from people like Dr. Ross, who support native habitats in their neighborhood and this type of work serves as an important pillar of community conservation and needs to be given the respect that it deserves.

Supporting pollinator habitats preserves biodiversity in our community and benefit insects, birds, and wildlife while also providing benefits for local gardens by ensuring the reproduction of flowering plants. According to the USDA, pollinators help about 80% of the world's flowering plants reproduce. In a world where devastating news greets us every day, why would we pull down a leader that is restoring life? A restored prairie or a pollinator garden could look messy if you haven't seen one before, but they are full of life and beauty, we should be celebrating his work, not mowing it down. We should all be so lucky to have someone with Dr. Ross' expertise and ability to maintain and protect a native pollinator habitat in our neighborhoods!

With the location of the Dr. Ross' prairie garden, it's important to highlight the benefit of tall grass prairie on flood prevention. The native plants' root systems run deeper than traditional turf grass, protects against erosion, and absorbs water that would otherwise quickly run off and contribute to potential flooding.

It is disheartening to note that the decision made by the City Commissioners may have been influenced by misinformation from one neighbor who doesn't appreciate the value of what they have in their neighborhood.

This past summer our office and partners successfully restored 81 acres into pollinator habitat at six Urban Woods and Prairie Sites. We had the help of over 140 volunteers and planted over 2,000 native plants into the ground to enhance our biodiversity. Our city has the potential to lead by example in sustainable urban development, and I hope the City Commissioners will seize this opportunity to make a positive impact on our environment and overturn this decision.

On May 8, 2023 the Fargo Fire Department embarked on four days of engagement with internal and external stakeholders. The process was facilitated by members of the Center for Public Safety Excellence's Technical Advisor Program. The first day involved a working lunch with stakeholder from the community as well as members from other City of Fargo Departments. The questions asked of the external stakeholders were:

- 1. What are your expectations of the Fargo Fire Department?
- 2. What areas of concern to you have about the Fargo Fire Department?
- 3. What do you feel the Fargo Fire Department does well?
- 4. What do you feel the Fargo Fire Department should change?
- 5. What do you feel the Fargo Fire Department should not change?

Finally, the external stakeholders were asked to prioritize the programs and services the Fargo Fire Department provides. This group indicated the following prioritization of programs and services:

- 1. Fire Suppression
- 2. Emergency Medical Services
- 3. Technical Rescue

The next three days a group of Fargo Fire Department members representing the three divisions of the department met to review the community expectations, develop or revise the mission, vision, and values. The process involved conducting an analysis of the agency's strengths, opportunities, aspirations, and results (SOAR). This process provided an environmental scanning for strategic direction, associated plans through the application of innovative ideas, and a positive

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strategic framework that brings clarity to the agency's vision for leadership in day-to-day functions.

Through that analysis five goals were formed:

- 1. Safeguard the community through proactive prevention, preparedness, and public education programs.
- 2. Ensure systems and processes are in place to minimize the impact on life and property form medicals, fires, disasters, and other emergencies.
- Recruit, develop, and retain the highest quality team members and implement a comprehensive training program that provides for continuous education and career preparation opportunities to all personnel.
- 4. Maintain an organization that effectively administers, plans, and manages the physical resources of the department.
- 5. The fire department will work to be dynamic and continually adjust to meet the changing fire problems, new technologies, new laws and regulations, and changes occurring in the community.

Along with the goals, a number of strategic objectives and tasks were developed. Measured outcomes were developed for all objectives to provide a tool to report on the progress of meeting the goals and objectives.

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Introduction

The community serviced by the Fargo Fire Department (FFD) receives high levels of professionalism and efficiency from the agency's proactive approach to risk reduction and emergency mitigation. The process utilized by the CPSE aligns with the Commission on Fire Accreditation International* (CFAI*) fire and emergency services accreditation model but also considers all parameters prescribed by the authority having jurisdiction.

The CPSE's approach to community-driven strategic planning gathers feedback and input from community and agency stakeholders while focusing on future change beyond the status quo. Beliefs, concepts, current processes, and values were among the many pieces considered and questioned to bring this planning document to reality. The FFD exhibited a commitment to the implementation and execution of this plan to become more efficient and effective in alignment with its community.

Process

Understanding what the customer desires is vital to the success of any organization. In this case, the customer is the community that the Fargo Fire Department serves. This applies even if the service organization is a governmental entity. Community-driven strategic planning ensures the community remains a focus of the organization's direction and community feedback is at the heart of all deliberations and development of this strategic plan.

The process of community-driven strategic planning and the plan itself represents the embrace of transition away from how an organization has always done things, seeking to find efficacies and outcomes based on change. The community-driven strategic plan provides a management roadmap built on a shared vision and structured for measurable results. With the involvement of a diverse group of agency stakeholders, the Fargo Fire Department's community-driven strategic plan encompasses various experiences, perceptions, and perspectives that can also work to build more internal organizational symbiosis. For the desired, measurable results to be realized, the process and the strategic plan must focus on substance, not form. Agency Background

The City of Fargo was founded in 1871, encompassing an area that was historically part of the Sioux territory and was an early stopping point for steamboats traversing the Red River



While the city was originally named Centralia, the name was changed to Fargo after William Fargo, the founder of Wells Fargo Express Company.

Throughout the city's history, Fargo has continued to grow and evolve, starting with the arrival of the Northern Pacific Railroad. By virtue of the railroad, Fargo became known as the "Gateway to the West."

Today, the City of Fargo is a thriving cultural, retail, healthcare, educational, and industrial center for southeastern North Dakota. With a population of over 127,000, Fargo is the home of North Dakota State University and several larger corporations. However, Fargo is also known for being a great place to have a smaller business or start a career.

The genesis of the Fargo Fire Department (FFD) dates back to 1875 in the form of two fire wardens who would patrol the city, watching for fires and protecting the population of 600 residents. The city and the department dealt with a number of conflagrations, the largest in 1893 when 31 blocks of downtown Fargo were destroyed by fire. However,

resiliency is indicative of the area. Within one year, 246 new brick buildings were built, along with new streets and a water system.


In 1903, the Fargo Fire Department transitioned from a volunteer department to a career organization. The FFD has also continued to grow and evolve along with the city as risks changed, partially due to the population and economic growth.

Today, the Fargo Fire Department protects the city's residents, businesses, and visitors from seven strategically deployed fire stations. In total, the FFD is comprised of 125 members who strive daily to fulfill their duties in a professional and courteous manner. Their commitment to their community through the provision of emergency and risk-reducing services is evident in all that they do. The FFD continues its endeavor to catch excellence for the good of all who live, work, and play in the City of Fargo.




Appendices

A. Community Stakeholder Findings

The Fargo Fire Department demonstrates a commitment to its community via a focus on community input and satisfaction. A community stakeholder session was held to gather feedback from the respondents on the agency and its various services delivered. The information gathered from the community stakeholder feedback provided understanding to the agency stakeholders of any misalignment with its organizational foundation and performance or values-based expectations or concerns from which new improvement strategies and processes may be created.

Community stakeholders were identified by the agency to ensure broad representation. The breakdown of groups represented is presented here:



Respondents were asked to list, in priority order, up to three subjects relative to expectations, concerns, and strengths or positives for the FFD. Expectations and concerns were then analyzed for themes and weighted. The numbers in the parentheses are the cumulative weighted value that correlate with the themes identified. While the themes are listed in prioritized, weighted order, all responses were important in the planning process. Strengths or positives are listed verbatim and may be repeated based on different respondents. The specific data and findings from the community stakeholder respondents are provided to follow.



B. Agency Stakeholder Work

A group of agency stakeholders representing the various segments of the FFD attended a three-day work session to review the community feedback, develop or revise the agency's mission and values, and establish a quality focus on the way forward in developing this community-driven strategic plan. Additionally, the process included an environmental scan in the form of a strengths, opportunities, aspirations, and results (SOAR) analysis to better understand the current situational aspects impacting the agency.

SOAR

The agency's internal stakeholders utilized a strategic environmental analytic method known as SOAR: where members consider the organization's current strengths, opportunities, future aspirations, and strategic results to formulate a path for continuous improvement. The SOAR process was conducted for reflection, focus, and alignment with the organization's set of values, its vision, and its mission. This appreciative inquiry process provided environmental scanning for strategic direction, associated plans through the application of innovative ideas, and a positive strategic framework that brings clarity to the agency's vision for leadership in day-to-day functions.

Foreword

As part of the community-driven strategic planning process, this management and implementation guide was developed to assist the Fargo Fire Department (FFD) in managing its future success through institutionalization, implementation, monitoring of progress, and results feedback. The FFD must remember that a plan without managed implementation will never result in change and greater success. This is a living document that the agency should use throughout the duration of its community-driven strategic plan. It provides for further revision, accountability, ways to measure and celebrate success, and desired outcomes. Additionally, information is provided to ensure alignment with the strategic vision of the authority having jurisdiction or other sources as determined by the FFD.

The Success of the Strategic Plan

The Fargo Fire Department approached its desire for organizational change and continuous improvement by developing a community-driven strategic plan focused on input and participation from the community and agency stakeholders. The success of this community-driven strategic plan will be rooted in a quality implementation and institutionalization plan, and support from all who hold a stake in the FFD.

Without a true focus on implementing and institutionalizing this plan, the FFD may fall short of the change it desires. The Center for Public Safety Excellence® (CPSE®) recognizes the agency's commitment to its community and supports the continuous improvement identified in this community-driven strategic plan.

Communication

Developing communication processes to disseminate the strategic plan's goals, objectives, and tasking concepts will be key to the agency's success in institutionalizing strategic planning processes. Even the best strategic plans are undermined by the inability to effectively communicate plan goals and objectives that align member actions and is a central reason agencies lose control during the implementation. Creating a comprehensive communication plan with clear accountability, ensuring the information needs of various stakeholders are met, and allowing relevant information to go to the right person at the right time to avoid information overload and confusion, will support implementation efforts.

There are various ways an agency may utilize its current communication systems to distribute the plan's elements and agency successes as implementation activities progress. Recognition of the importance of reporting progress to all levels of the agency and its stakeholders will assist in determining which of those systems should be included in the disseminated information.



Institutionalization and Implementation

A contributing factor to the success of the community-driven strategic plan is the institutionalization of the plan across all levels of the organization. Without it, the plan will remain siloed, and implementation may be hindered. Institutionalization provides an excellent opportunity to communicate with all stakeholders about the intended changes, applicable outcomes, and the direction the department is heading.

Many avenues of institutionalization and implementation

Tips for Institutionalization

- Communicate to all levels, even during onboarding.
- 2. Get all levels involved in the implementation and tap their creativity.
- 3. Empower all leaders and let them go.
- 4. Maintain accountability.
- 5. Report progress regularly for all to see.

are used by agencies that sincerely understand the power of the community-driven strategic plan. Just as the plan's development included agency stakeholders representing a broad spectrum internally, the implementation phase must also ensure that the same representation model is utilized. All agency stakeholders who contributed to the plan's development should be empowered to ensure that members throughout the organization can be part of the implementation phase. This will further institutionalize the plan processes and add value toward implementation successes.



Attached you will find the North Broadway Bridge Decision Document.

The decision document was created to aid in the decision-making process for this complex project and comes down to two main questions:

- 1. Does the City Commission support one of the 'Build' options, and if so,
- 2. How does the City pay for the project?

If the decision is to support one of the 'Build' options, it appears that the current cost splits and proposed financing plan are not supported by Clay County. Therefore, an alternative financing plan would need to be developed. Currently, a bridge replacement project for North Broadway is slated to receive \$5.4 million in calendar year 2026 as part of the FM Metro COG Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Potential options for funding are outlined further in the decision document.

Recommended Motion:

Staff recommends that the City Commission use the decision document to determine which of the evaluated options is supported. If one or more of the 'Build' options receives support, a preferred funding option would need to be selected.
