Bids have been received for the Wastewater Treatment Facility Phase IIB Expansion project and are summarized on the attached Bid Tabulation. Bids were received for the following: Contract A — General Construction, Contract B — Mechanical Construction, Contract C — Electrical Construction, Contract D — Combined, and Alternates 1-7. The lowest combination of Contracts A plus B plus C or Contract D will be considered. The alternates can be accepted or rejected as the project budget allows.

The low bids for each respective contract are as follows:

Therefore, the lowest bid was Contract D in the amount of \$124,230,000. from PKG Contracting. Six additive alternates and one deductive alternate were received. Due to the overall project budget constraints, we recommend not awarding the six additive alternates. Alternate 7 is a deductive alternate for utilizing a different VFD manufacturer than the standard manufacturer used at the wastewater treatment facility. We recommend accepting deductive Alternate 7 to reduce the contract amount by \$280,000.

The bid from PKG Contracting is over the Engineer's Estimate of \$117,000,000. The Engineer's Estimate was completed in November 2019 at the 90% plan and specification phase. At that point, it was clear deep foundations were necessary on all buildings and tanks based on the geotechnical report and structural analysis. This was not originally included in the project estimate as only 2 out of over 40 structures on the campus have a deep foundation system. In February of 2020, the American Iron and Steel provisions (required by SRF funding) were modified, causing significant cost increases that were unforeseen. The suppliers and contractors estimate approximately 5-6% increase in additional project costs for AIS and other SRF requirements. Finally, the project bid during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Various contractors, vendors and suppliers reported as much as 5-8% cost increases due to the unknowns such as scheduling delays, less bidders/competition, labor force issues and material costs.

This project at the wastewater treatment facility is essential for the City of Fargo to continue to serve its regional wastewater customers. Time is of the essence since the full wastewater connection with West Fargo cannot occur until this project is complete. The timeline is already abridged for

construction and any delays in awarding the contract would likely cause additional cost increases to the project. In addition, the cost increases for deep foundations and changes to SRF requirements were unforeseen but cannot be eliminated. The cost increases for COVID-19 could also increase and may last many months. It is anticipated any delays in award would increase overall project costs since the project completion date must remain the same.

Based on the bids received, we recommend the City of Fargo award the project to PKG Contracting with deductive Alternate 7 contingent on the North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality (NDDEQ) approval. The plans and specifications were submitted and approved by the NDDEQ. A State Revolving Fund loan at 2% interest rate for a term of 30 years is in place for financing these improvements and is planned to be repaid through user rates. The North Dakota PFA recommends continuing to draw on the existing loan and if more funds are necessary, the loan can be modified at that time. In addition, a portion of the project Storm Lift Station 24 is being funded separately through the Engineering Department in the amount of \$2,000,000 and will not be included in the SRF loan.

The total project cost for the base bid Contract D plus deductive Alternate 7 is \$123,950,000.

A Notice of Award contingent on North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality approval in this amount to PKG Contracting is attached for your consideration.

Jim,

Per your request, I have reviewed PKG's bid for Phase IIB with an eye on quantifying the cost impact for SRF and to look for VE opportunities I see as the contractor on the project.

As you know with SRF funding, contractors are required to comply with both the AIS (American Iron & Steel) Act and Davis-Bacon wage rates.

- AIS requires domestic steel versus non-domestic steel which results in a 30 50% increase in price on affected materials; and
- Davis-Bacon wage rates are on average 25-30% higher than current local prevailing wages.

Due to the sheer size of this project and the number of labor hours it will take to complete the job, the overall impact of these two requirements affected the bid somewhere between \$6.8 to \$7.0 million. The breakdown is roughly \$4.5 - \$4.7M for AIS with the balance being in wages.

Also, in this process, I reviewed the overall project design and have identified opportunities where VE could be utilized to reduce project cost. However, while those opportunities individually may be appealing, with the project already on a tight timeline, any idea will need to be collectively discussed. A re-design could most certainly affect our ability to meet the Train 1 interim milestone. If Train 1 completion is late, the overall project completion date will be late as well.

That said, the best option for value-engineering would be to look at items that are not required to achieve the Milestone 1 completion. This would allow more time to do the proper study and complete the necessary re-engineering and yet avoid costly construction delays.

Area 21 is a good example of an opportunity. This structure could possibly be eliminated with the idea of converting a Secondary Digester to fulfill the need for Filtrate Equalization. This could save the project potentially \$2 million depending modification cost of the Secondary Digester.

We have other VE ideas, but we are reluctant to identify specifics in this letter without a round table discussion because of project deadlines being priority. Cost and time associated with an extensive engineering review are simply luxuries the project does not have on the front half in order to make Milestone 1 deadline.

Jim,

To respond to your inquiry regarding the COVID-19 pandemic and how it may have affected the recent bid for the Phase IIB project, I offer the following comments.

Information available indicates the construction industry is being affected by COVID-19 on both a global and domestic scale. For the Phase IIB project specifically, a few things are evident that likely make this information valid for our market.

The number of subcontractor and supplier bids PKG received for most divisions of work were down by an average of 12-15%. This does not necessarily mean that we did not receive the lowest bids; rather we received fewer bids than anticipated for a project this size.

In addition, we have been hearing concerns from subcontractors and suppliers regarding material procurement as well as shipping concerns due to COVID-19 shutdowns.

There is really no way of quantifying how these points may have affected the bid in actual dollars. However, in my professional opinion, I believe today the COVID-19 pandemic impacted the overall project cost by an extra 5-6%. We have had ongoing discussions with subcontractors and suppliers in the region and continue to gather information that should allow us to further quantify and paint a clearer picture of the economic impact.

# Background

The City of Fargo completed a Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) Facility Plan to review the existing facilities condition & capacity. The facility plan assessed all process equipment and structural components of the WWTP, as well as deficiencies associated with capacity, condition, and future regulations. The Facility Plan recommendations were prioritized via a phased approach based on immediate needs and deficiencies, with a goal to adequately treat projected hydraulic and organic loading over the next 20-plus years. The Phase II recommendations in the Facility Plan focused on expansion needs to meet the 20 year capacity requirements for Fargo growth and regionalization. A Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) in 2017 identified the basis of design for the facility improvements, recommended treatment technologies and opinions of probable costs.

To meet the schedule outlined in the Wastewater Sewer Agreement with West Fargo, portions of the expansion project need to be completed in late 2022-(Phase IIB). Certain areas of the WWTP are currently under construction (Phase IIA) and will be completed in the coming months.

### Phase II B Improvements

Components of the Phase IIB design include a combined head works building, hybrid IFAS for biological treatment, final clarifiers, blower building, return and waste activated sludge (RAS/WAS) pump station, thickening building, primary digester, odor control, and ancillary pumps, vaults and piping. Once operational the facility will double its capacity to treat 29 million gallons per day, serving a regional population of 270,700.

The Hybrid Integrated Fixed Film Activated Sludge (IFAS) technology utilizes three stages

- 1. An anaerobic zone to reduce biological phosphorus
- 2. An anoxic zone for denitrification
- 3. An oxygen/aerobic zone w/media to reduce biochemical oxygen demand (BOD) and ammonia.

The Phase II Expansion was proposed to be completed as follows:

- Phase II A (2018-2020) Important for the initial West Fargo connection
  - Centrifuge, UV Disinfection, Yard, Process & Discharge Piping, Storm Water LS Repairs,
     Digester Covers, Clarifier Equipment, Site Security.
- Phase II B (2020-2024) Double capacity and improved treatment
  - Procurement Equipment for full expansion (Pumps, Controls, Mechanisms).

Thank you for the opportunity to provide the enclosed Task Order 23 regarding construction engineering services for the Fargo Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) Phase IIB Expansion project. The capacity of the WWTF will be reached in the near future based on current City of Fargo planning numbers and regionalization with surrounding communities. As a result, a wastewater treatment expansion is necessary due to the facility's current capacity limitations.

A Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) identified the facility updates necessary to meet future capacity requirements. Updates must be completed to provide capacity for Fargo growth and regionalization with West Fargo. The first phase of expansion (Phase IIA) included items necessary to bridge the existing facility capacity in the short term and process components in the north area of the existing plant. Phase IIA expansion construction is nearing completion. The next phase of the expansion (Phase IIB) includes a combined headworks building, IFAS for biological treatment and nutrient reduction, final clarifiers, blower building, RAS/WAS pump station, thickening building, primary digester, filtrate equalization, Storm Lift Station 24, odor control, rehabilitation of various facility components, ancillary pumps, structures, vaults, manholes, piping, paving and landscaping. Once the expansion is operational, the facility will have capacity to treat 29 million gallons per day, serving a regional population of 270,700. To meet the required deadline for providing wastewater service to West Fargo in December of 2022, Phase IIB was recently advertised and bid. After award by City Commission, construction will begin.

The project will be funded through the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan program. The SRF loan will provide an immediate funding source for the Phase II construction contract and engineering services at a low interest rate of 2% for 30 years.

# **Project Background**

The City of Fargo completed a Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) Plan in 2014 to review the existing facility's condition and capacity; assess all process equipment and structural components of the WWTF; identify deficiencies regarding capacity, condition, safety and future regulations; and develop strategies to alleviate deficiencies and adequately treat the projected hydraulic and organic requirements of the facility over the next twenty-plus years.

The Facility Plan recommendations were prioritized via a phased approach based on the most immediate needs. Phase I of the Facility Plan included equipment replacement and upgrades to existing facility components due to equipment age, condition, workers' safety and capacity. The Phase I improvement project was completed and addressed age and equipment condition issues necessary for reliable wastewater treatment; however, the improvements did not add additional capacity to the facility. The Phase II recommendations in the Facility Plan focused on the expansion needs for the facility to meet the projected 20-year wastewater capacity requirements for City of Fargo growth and regionalization. A Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) in 2017 identified the basis of design for the facility improvements, recommended treatment technologies to meet projected effluent limits and presented opinions of probable costs. The Phase II expansion was split into two phases, Phase IIA and Phase IIB. Certain components were prioritized into Phase IIA to allow the City of Fargo to receive a limited amount of flow from West Fargo before the entire facility expansion could be completed. The Phase IIA project included a centrifuge process, UV disinfection, effluent pumping, miscellaneous east train equipment replacements and various piping components. The Phase IIA project is currently under construction and nearing completion.

To meet the schedule outlined in the Wastewater Service Agreement with West Fargo and continued growth of Fargo's regional facility, the following items must be completed as part of the Phase IIB Expansion project.

- A new headworks facility with influent pumping, screening, grit removal and odor control
- A new west treatment train including biological nutrient removal
- Two new final clarifiers
- Blower building and associated electrical equipment
- Return activated sludge (RAS) and waste activated sludge (WAS) pumping
- Scum pumping
- RAS/WAS pump station with process control laboratory
- In-plant waste pump station
- Thickening for scum and waste activated sludge
- New primary anaerobic digester
- Digester electrical room
- Primary digester rehabilitation
- Sludge pumping improvements
- Digester gallery heating, pumping, pipe and valve improvements
- Dewatering building improvements
- Dewatering filtrate equalization and pumping
- Odor and corrosion control
- Splitter structures, manholes and vaults
- Underground piping and valves
- Reuse water system pumping and distribution
- Protective coating systems
- Storm sewer improvements including a new Lift Station 24
- Power distribution and communications improvements
- Electrical, instrumentation and control components

Site grading, paving and landscaping

Project components included in Phase IIB will complete the 20-year construction requirements of the WWTF as shown in the following figure. The Phase IIB Expansion will provide capacity for approximately 270,700 people.



During the design phase for Phase IIB, the effluent forcemain from the wastewater treatment facility to the stabilization ponds experienced failures. Emergency repairs were difficult during wet weather and nearly caused permit violations due to the inability to use the forcemain. Since this is a critical component of wet weather flow relief and must be used when the facility cannot meet permit limits, the design of a forcemain replacement project was included in Phase IIB.

The design for Phase IIB is complete and the bidding process is finished. This task order is for construction services for Phase IIB, which will include the improvements necessary for long term growth of Fargo, regionalization, nutrient removal and solids treatment.

A Clean Water State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan application was submitted to the North Dakota Department of Health (NDDH) for funding approval during the PER phase of this project. The SRF program will provide a 30-year 2% interest loan available immediately for the Phase II project, including the construction contract and all engineering services.

The Cass Clay Food Partners continues to work on food access during this COVID-19 pandemic. As follow up to our presentation at the last City Commission meeting, we have been working on clarification of existing ordinances and codes related to the ability of residents to grow their own food. We are compiling this information in a Frequently Asked Questions format and plan to share some of these findings at the May 4<sup>th</sup> City Commission meeting.

In an effort to support residents in becoming more self-sufficient, a common request has been to increase the number of chickens allowed under the current ordinance. Currently 4 hens are allowed and we would like to request this number be increased to 6; all other provisions in the ordinance will remain in effect. This request would go into effect immediately upon execution with an end date of September 30, 2020. Attached is the Resolution Moratorium for your consideration.

# RESOLUTION

# [MORATORIUM TO PERMIT THE KEEPING OF UP TO SIX CHICKENS]

WHEREAS, The Mayor has declared a state of emergency as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, by order and proclamation of March 16, 2020; and

**WHEREAS**, The City of Fargo and its citizens are encouraged to participate in social distancing to curb the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic; and

**WHEREAS**, In order to help reduce the spread of COVID-19, the City of Fargo and its citizens are opting to engage in other means of procuring food, such as eggs, from sources that reduce human contact; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 12-0306 of the Fargo Municipal Code provides that citizens may keep up to four (4) chickens with an approved city permit; and

WHEREAS, It is hereby found and declared that the health, safety and welfare of the City of Fargo and its occupants will be benefitted by keeping additional chickens and fosters appropriate social distancing for the curbing of the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, This moratorium will extend beyond the City's state of emergency declaration given the high egg laying season of chickens in the spring and summer seasons;

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED:

- 1. **MORATORIUM ESTABLISHED**. A moratorium is hereby established to increase the permitted number of chickens as set forth in Section 12-0306 of the Fargo Municipal Code from four (4) to six (6) in number.
- 2. Mayor Authorized to Implement by Further Order or Orders. The Mayor of the City is hereby authorized to promulgate and issue one or more executive orders as may be necessary to implement and clarify the terms of this moratorium, under the authority of F.M.C. §10-0318 and hereof, which executive orders may be further ratified or amended by the Board of City Commissioners as may be necessary or appropriate.
- 3. Effect of Moratorium Limitation of Enforcement. This moratorium as to the enforcement of certain regulations or ordinances of the City shall be serve to instruct, order and limit code enforcement officers or inspectors, police officers, and prosecutors of the City or any other law or code enforcement officers, inspectors or agents to refrain from enforcing City Ordinances contrary to the terms hereof and to refrain from charging or citing persons, firms or other entities accordingly and, furthermore, said instruction,

- order and limitation in enforcement shall survive the termination of this moratorium, whether such termination occurs by lapse of time or by affirmative act.
- 4. **Effective Date and Term.** This moratorium shall take effect immediately upon the adoption hereof [the "Effective Date"] and shall extend until 11:59 p.m. on the 30<sup>th</sup> day of September, 2020, unless it is otherwise terminated or extended by resolution or motion of the Board of City Commissioners of the City of Fargo.

# **BACKGROUND**

At the April 6, 2020, City Commission meeting, Mayor Mahoney gave an update on the COVID-19 financial impacts to the City of Fargo's 2020 budget. The Mayor indicated that the Finance Committee would be evaluating the potential for declining revenues and, as a result, looking at potential suspensions of spending in the General Fund, Enterprise Funds and Capital Outlay Funds. At the same time, the Mayor wanted the Finance Committee to complete a thorough examination of Federal and State funding programs that might be available to municipalities to replace lost revenues. The budget team was directed to work with Department and Division Heads to review budgets and develop prudent budget reductions with respect to prioritized expenditures and levels of service. The Mayor indicated a list of budget recommendations would be prepared by the budget team and forwarded to the Finance Committee and City Commission.

# **2020 REVENUE BUDGET REVIEW**

For the past 3-4 weeks, the budget team has been evaluating the City's 2020 budgets, starting with the revenue budgets in light of potential declines in associated with the coronavirus. If you may recall from the Mayor's 2020 budget presentation, the City currently operates under four major revenue categories that include the General Fund, Utility Funds, Debt Service Funds and Special Revenue Funds. In this exercise, the major focus of the budget team's review were related to revenues and expenditures in the General Fund and Utility Funds.

The first step in the evaluation process was to review the first quarter revenue reports associated with the General Fund and Utility Funds. A detailed first quarter comparison of budgeted versus actual revenues was conducted The first quarter reports showed that budget revenues were relatively close to budgeted revenues as reflected below:

Re: Reduced 2020 CIP

As we continue to operate through the coronavirus epidemic, it has become apparent that we will not be able to complete all the projects originally approved in the 2020 CIP. There are many factors associated with the recommended reduction of the 2020 CIP, some of which are the decrease in allocation of Prairie Dog Funds and Sales Tax, along with fewer seasonal staffing. While it is never our desire to defer necessary maintenance, preservation, or improvement projects, we certainly understand the need to do so at this time. There are a number of projects that were created, bid, and awarded anticipating the utilization of Prairie Dog Funds and if those funds are not available, we have the ability to use Infrastructure Sales Tax (Fund 420) in lieu of Prairie Dog Funds. In the original approved 2020 CIP, we anticipated the expenditure of \$11,403,678 in Prairie Dog Funds and \$6,166,199 in Sales Tax for a total of \$17,569,877 between the two funds. The reduced 2020 CIP, we anticipate would expend \$10,399,253 between those same two funds, which is a reduction of \$7,170,624 or about 40.8%.

The full extent of the changes between the original approved CIP (\$108,520,575 Total Program) and the reduced CIP (\$81,915,432 Total Program) can be seen by comparing the two attachments. The following color codes will aid in tracking the changes between the two CIPs.
