
Winter Read-a-Thon Starts January 4

While the pandemic and the cold, wintery weather may keep us at home, we can still find places to go when we read. Once again, the library invites readers of all ages, from babies to adults, to pick up a book (or two, or three) during the 2021 Winter Read-A-Thon and travel to magical worlds, other countries, or through time – and earn prizes while reading. The Winter Read-a-thon runs Jan. 4 through Feb. 28.

It's easy to participate. This year's winter reading program is online at READsquared, an online service designed for readers to log the time they spend reading in order to earn prizes for their efforts. Visit the library's READsquared website at fargolibrary.readsquared.com,

or download the app for Android or Apple to get started. Book logs are also available online and can be printed at home. All readers are encouraged to read to earn chances to enter prize drawings. Book logs are due on or before Sunday, Feb. 28, to be eligible for prizes and prize drawings. Prize drawings will be held in early March.



ALEXANDER HAMILTON EXHIBIT: MARCH 31 – APRIL 28 AT THE MAIN LIBRARY

Alexander Hamilton, one of America's most visionary founding fathers, is with us every day, not only in our wallets on the \$10 bill, but also in the republic's most vital institutions. An exhibit honoring the statesman, scholar, and former Secretary of the Treasury will visit the Main Library from March 31 to April 28.

Alexander Hamiton: Immigrant, Patriot, Visionary, a national traveling exhibition developed by the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History and made possible by the Rockefeller Foundation, will examine Hamilton's role during the Revolutionary War and Founding period (1774-1804) in creating the economic, constitutional, social, journalistic, political, and foreign policy templates for modern America. It will acquaint visitors with a statesman and visionary whose life inspired discussion and controversy and shaped the America we live in two hundred years after his death. Colonial era information and themed craft packets will be available for kids in the Children's Area at the Main Library (while supplies last) as part of this exhibit.

YOUTH IN REVOLT: ALEXANDER HAMILTON AND COMING OF AGE IN THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION ONLINE PRESENTATION SET FOR MARCH 30

Join us as Donald Johnson, Assistant Professor of Early American History at NDSU, uses the career of Alexander Hamilton and others to explore how the American Revolution affected the lives of those who came of age during the political crisis that preceded it, the War that it led to, and the chaotic period that ensued.

At the dawn of the Revolution, more than 1/3 of Americans were under the age of 24. While older Revolutionaries like George Washington and Benjamin Franklin may have pioneered the ideology of rebellion, it fell to younger founders like Alexander Hamilton and James Madison to do much of the fighting and governing in the post-Revolutionary landscape. This presentation explores both how these individuals' lives were shaped by the Revolution and how those young people shaped the course of Revolutionary events. **Pre-registration is required.** Note: this program will be conducted online. 



The Fargo Public Library offers bike locks for patrons to use while they visit the library. Bike locks can be borrowed at the circulation desk with a Fargo Public Library card in good standing (one bike lock per

card). Bike locks are due the same day as checkout and may be returned to any library book return. Bike locks cannot be put on hold or renewed, and do not accrue daily fines. The replacement cost for each bike lock is \$7. If any piece of the lock is not returned (key or cable), the patron will be charged the full replacement cost. Please note: Regardless of whether a library bike lock is used, the Fargo Public Library is not responsible for any lost, stolen, or damaged bicycles.

THE FPL IS FINE-FREE

As of Oct. 1, 2020, the Fargo Public Library eliminated fines in order to increase patron access to library collections, services, and resources. The policy, approved by the library Board of Trustees, aims to increase access to library materials and services for all.

"The Fargo Public Library is excited to announce that we are no longer charging overdue fines," said Library Director Tim Dirks. "In this time of limited services due to the pandemic, the Fargo Public Library wants to ensure that all citizens have the opportunity to access library collections. By eliminating fines, we are hoping to increase access, boost literacy, and remove barriers for all."

Research shows that almost all libraries of any size, large or small, which have gone fine-free see very little change in when materials are returned; even when fine-free, most items are returned on time. In addition, the lack of fines encourages patrons to check out more books and other items. In 2018, the Fargo Public Library eliminated late fines on children's items, and these items continue to be returned to the library at the same rate as before the elimination of children's fines.

It is important to note that the policy applies only to fines incurred from failure to return materials on time. The library continues to charge fees for lost or damaged items.
